NO PAUSE IN SHIPBUILDING

Whether the war ends soon or late,
America's great shipbuilding program
is to go right on to completion. Chair-
man Hurley and Director Schwab of the
Emergency Fleet Corporation
have announced that armistice and
peace arrangements will make little
difference.

Of the 15,000,000 tons of shipping
called for, less than 3,000,000 tons
have yet been built. The government
figures that the ships will be needed
just about as much after the war as
they are now. It will take a huge
fleet to bring our armies and their
equipment home. It will probably
take a fleet no less huge to carry to
foreign lands the vast quantities of
American goods that will be wanted
abroad for the rebuilding of devastat-
ed cities and the restocking and refur-
nishing of countries left bare by years
of warfare, and to bring us the raw
materials we need for our manufac-
tures.

Some changes will be made, natu-
rally. The wooden ship program may
be curtailed, because the wooden ves-
sels have not fulfilled expectations
even for emergency purposes, and the
experts say they will be handicapped
in the foreign trade under normal
peace conditions. The call now is for
big steel merchantmen. The govern-
ment will continue turning them out
by the hundred, until there are
enough for all our national purposes.

Inefficient plants may be closed,
but the efficient shipyards will con-
tinue operating to capacity, and the
same efforts will be expected of ship-
builders as heretofore. "We will lead
to the west coast," says Chairman
Hurley, "to continue the pace it has
maintained, and to the yards of the
East and South and the Great Lakes
to increase their output. Every com-
petent ship worker, every technical
expert and every trained executive in
the yards owes it to the nation to re-
main at his post, where his services
will count most, until our ship-con-
struction program is completed."

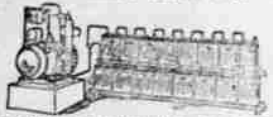

NO AUTHORITY FOR
CLOSING, SAYS HOLMES

That the state fuel administrator
is not in authority to order the closing
of the Standard Oil company to enforce
all local orders to close up after 6
o'clock and on Sundays, is indicated
in a ruling received here today.

An extract from a letter from State
Fuel Administrator Holmes received
this morning by F. D. Gilbert, County
Fuel Administrator, reads as follows:
"The method adopted by the oil com-
panies of forcing garages to remain
closed from 6 p. m. to 6 a. m. and on
Sundays by refusing to sell gasoline
or distillate to the dealer until he first

agrees not to sell during the proscrib-
ed hours, and claiming authority from
the U. S. Fuel administration for so
doing, has been referred by Fred J.
Holmes, federal fuel administrator
for Oregon, to M. L. Resqua, director
of the national oil division of the fuel
administration at Washington. The
state administration will abide by the
national decision.

"I shall cheerfully cooperate in any
measure inaugurated by the govern-
ment," said Mr. Holmes, "but until I
am so advised, I shall not sanction the
enforced closing of garages by oil
companies in the name of the fuel ad-
ministration."

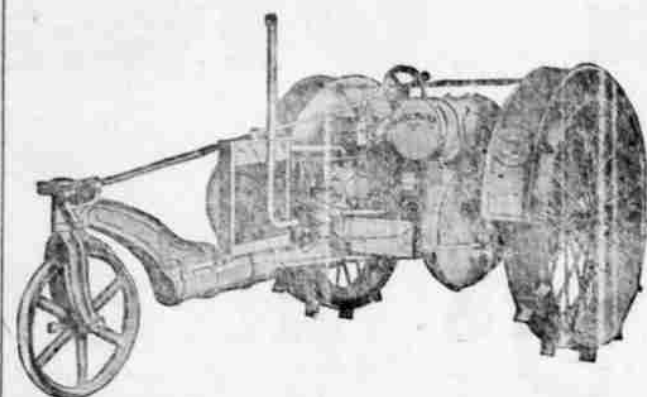
