THE WAR WORK FUND

The United War Work Campaign is
on. Seven great national welfare
agencies are uniting in this effort to
raise funds for war relief.

The societies thus combining are the
Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A., the na-
tional Catholic Council including the
Knights of Columbus, the Jewish Wel-
fare Board, the Salvation Army, the
American Library association and the
War Camp Community Service.

There is little need to speak of the
work done by these various associa-
tions among our boys in camp and
field. Their record of splendid service
is generally known.

There is no indication that the need
of their service will be in any way
abated for a long time. Even though
the armistice is signed, the period of
demobilization with its long stretches
of enforced idleness in barracks, will
hold more danger for the health and
morals of our boys than life in the
field.

It is largely these great organiza-
tions, taking to our soldiers the care
and spirit of home, that we may de-
pend on to bring them home as clean
and sane as when they went away.

Every institution of the seven min-
isters to some special need, all are de-
serving of support. They ask for
\$170,500,000. It should be not our
duty but our joy to see that they get
it. Albany and Linn county should
respond in the same generous spirit
that marked similar drives in the
past.

THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

President Van Hise of the Univer-
sity of Wisconsin, returning from a
European trip, gives a gratifying re-
port of the sentiment abroad for the
League of Nations. Speaking of Eng-
land particularly, he says: "In no
case did I find any dissent from the
principle that a league of free nations
should be formed, and practically ev-
ery representative man in any impor-
tant office that I met, including the
prime minister, unqualifiedly com-
mitted himself to the principle."

Most Americans now take the at-
tainment of this ideal almost as an
accomplished fact. Those who are
more dubious of its success may find
reassurance in a unanimity of opinion
among our allies that is almost as
complete as our own. There is no
question that this goal of so many
centuries of hope and striving can be
won if the American public maintains
a firm and unanimous insistence.

Such an achievement will be, as
President Van Hise says, "the great-
est advance in the organization of the
world since the union of the United
States of America." And it will be a
logical development from that union.
A successful League of Nations will
mean the Americanization of the
World—a triumph not of American
power, but of the American idea.
