SHARING FOOD

"I am not willing to economize on food for the sake of helping to feed the Hun!" cries many a man and woman, indignant at the suggestion that we must start now sharing our supplies with our beaten enemies.

Our army does not feel that way. A story from the front tells of an American soldier who was taking a batch of fresh prisoners back of the lines. He had some chocolate in his pocket, and was hungry. Starting to eat it, he instinctively turned and divided it with his prisoners.

The Germans accepted the gift with amazement, not unmixed with contempt. "Why do you do that?" they asked.

The American carefully explained that Americans regard a man as their enemy only as long as they are fighting him, and when the fight is over, he is "simply another human being."

Those Germans were unconvinced. They thought there was some ulterior motive about it, possibly some trick. That did not matter with their generous, matter-of-fact, typically American captor, and it should not matter with us.

The war is over. Austro-Hungarians and Germans are now to be regarded as "other human beings," for our own self-respect if for no other reason.

They are hungry. A Belgian diplomat at Washington, who makes no pretense of love for the Germans, says that they and their former allies will be starving in six weeks unless we send them food.

If we do not send it from motives of humanity, we might well do so for prudential reasons. Hunger breeds anarchy. We do not want anarchy in Central Europe. We want order restored there, because one plague spot affects all the world, and because only order will enable our enemies to fulfill their vast war obligations to the nations they have wronged.

PEACE-TIME PROGRESS

The war department has started "charting the air lines" of the United States. Army aviators are taking pictures with stereoscopic cameras showing all landmarks such as cities, railroads, waterways, mountains, etc., along prospective airplane routes, for guidance to pilots in cross-country flights.

This work is said to be preliminary to the establishment of a regular aviation mail and passenger service between important population centers in every section of the country.

Thus already we begin preparations for developing the most modern form of transportation on a big scale. It is merely one indication of the vast material progress we may expect to make now along many lines, if we apply to peace pursuits half the intelligence and energy we have devoted to war. There ought to be a tremendous awakening in every useful department of human activity.

GUNNER DEAD; PILOT, UNKNOWN, FLIES ON

PARIS, Nov. 19.—The extraordinary experience of flying for some time, unconscious of the fact that his machinegunner was lying in a crumpled heap in the cockpit with a bullet thru his head, befell Lieut. Henriques Crawford, American pilot flying with French squadrons.

The grim story is told in the brief official report of Lieut. Crawford to his commanding officer.

"... There were heavy clouds at 400 metres on the afternoon of —, and we were flying just below them in company with other of our bombing planes. Lieut. Craig told me to go farther north over our objective in order to get a better target. ... We had narrowly missed a collision with one of our own planes, and as we came down out of the clouds, we were attacked almost immediately from the rear. We dodged and continued our course. ... Later we sighted another enemy plane and I turned toward it. ... Lieut. Craig did not fire so I glanced back and saw his guns pointing upward, while he was

lying in a heap in the pit. I lost the attacking planes in the clouds and landed as quickly as possible at the aviation field at —. The bullet had struck him in the center of the forehead, passing thru the head and completely shattering the skull. ... Lieut. Craig had always shown himself to be the highest type of American, an excellent observer, cool and fearless in any emergency. ... Lieut. Harry W. Craig, the observer, had been decorated twice by the French and cited in army orders for bravery.
