

Fear Versus Sense of Duty Equals Shellshock

LONDON, Nov. 19.—A soldier suffers from shellshock when great, overwhelming fear crushes against his sense of duty. He tries with all his moral fibre to conquer that fear and it is when he fails that shellshock comes, shattering his nerves and leaving him sometimes with a blank mind.
