REFORMED "REDS"

Many are the fruits of victory. One of them is the improved situation in Russia. The Bolsheviks seem to be reforming.

Those pleasant gentlemen had announced a great massacre to take place on Nov. 10. It was to be a sort of Russian St. Bartholemew, on a vast scale. All the "bourgeois" or middle-class Russians were to be killed at one swoop. Such, at least, was the report.

Instead of this bloody climax of Bolshevik horrors, there came word from Petrograd on Nov. 10 that the Bolsheviks had given amnesty to all hostages and to nearly all political prisoners.

It was about this same time that the Bolsheviks formally announced their readiness to "make peace" with the allies who had never so much as taken official notice of their absurd declaration of war.

The assurance of allied victory was enough to wean those "Red" traitors from their German sympathies, the those sympathies were liberally paid for with German money. The severity of the German armistice terms makes them still more mild. They will soon be cooing like veritable doves of peace. That, however, will not save them from a stern reckoning for their unspeakable crimes.

FORWARD, MARCH!

It is "Forward, march!" for business now. The government has eased its war restrictions. There are no longer any "nonessential industries." All those which have been restricted are permitted at once to increase their output 50 per cent of the amount of curtailment. Soon that limitation will be removed, and business will be thrown wide open again.

normal capacity. Next January, when the former ruling would have shut off production altogether, it may jump to 100 per cent.

Every business is being encouraged to get under way, with a full head of steam, just as rapidly as conditions permit. The government is cooperating to that end. War production is

not being stopped all at once—that would be unwise economically even though it were wise militarily. As the output of warstuff is curtailed, peace production will take its place. The war department and the business men's war board have the whole big, complex matter well in hand. There is plenty of work for every-

body. There are plenty of orders, old and new. There is plenty of credit for proper purposes. There need not even be a temporary pause in our prosperity, if business men keep cool and take advantage of their opportunities. With the transition once accomplished, we shall have a larger vol-

ume of sound, normal, permanent business than ever before, because the whole world needs peace goods and is eager to buy them.

Butter and Cheese Men to Meet in Portland

O. A. C., Corvallis, Nov. 19.—Special.—A big convention of Oregon butter and cheese makers will be held in Portland Dec. 11 and 12. In connection, a butter and cheese exhibit will be held in which prizes totaling \$350 will be awarded.

Wholesalers and factory men will participate. Speakers will be on hand from the Department of Agriculture, federal market bureau, and O. A. C. Leading butter and cheese men from Oregon and the nation will discuss problems vital to the industry.

The meet will occur in the Portland Hotel.
