SCIENCE BOOK HALTS CAREER OF BULLET

PORTLAND, Nov. 29.—Battle lore is full of incidents where a tiny Bible or a New Testament carried in the pocket of a soldier have warded off the cruel bullet traveling straight to his heart. History is just as rich with tales of the efficacious work of a deck of cards in the same heroic field. Now comes the story of the pocket edition of "Science and Health" by Mary Baker Eddy saving the life of a young Canadian soldier.

Nelson H. Bell, aged 23, brother of Mrs. Florence C. Roberts, of 634 Tillamook street, went into one of the terrific battles that marked the final strokes toward world freedom and carried a Christian Science textbook in his blouse pocket over his heart. Along with it was a letter from his mother.

The letter was pierced by a ball and has a hole in it the size of a 50-cent piece. But there the missile which would have brought sure death to the young fighter was stopped. He was wounded in other places on his body, and is now recovering rapidly in a military hospital of England, according to latest letters to his mother.

NO LONELINESS AT NIGHT

All Sorts of Animal Life Shared Room of Guests Sojourning in Japanese Hotel.

Yet I am forced to admit that never have I been on more intimate terms with so many forms of animal life in any building as in a Japanese hotel. Fishes only were absent, and I am convinced that if I could have remained, it would be only a question of time when the remarkable climbing fish of Japanese waters would have hopped across my portal. When a gentle rain began to fall at dusk and continued throughout the night, it seemed as if most of the insect life of Java took refuge in our room, and attempted suicide against our electric light bulbs. One of the first arrivals was a mole cricket. I spent much energy in a pursuit of the first arrival, before I realized that race suicide played no part in the life problems of gryllotalpa. Legions followed, escorted by myriads of mosquitoes, moths, beetles and nocturnal dragonflies. Then the vertebrate phyla passed in review. A great, bubble-eyed toad hopped fearlessly about our feet dignifiedly searching the floor for fallen insects, while a pair of mice slipped from corner to corner on the same errand. The air was winnowed now and then by small bats, and the walls and ceilings were quartered by vacuum-toed lizards, pale-headed geckos which wiggled swiftly from moth to moth, or posed like delicate Japanese paintings on shoji. Over the electric light a pair of Indian sparrows sat on their nest in the full glare, waiting for the cessation of this artificial day. At last we crept beneath our nettings and in the darkness listened to the pattering, and were lulled to sleep by the subdued small talk of all the little bungalow beings.

DENIED EQUALITY OF SEXES

Men in 1813 Had Decided Views as to Woman's Intellect and Her Sphere of Duty.

There lies on the desk a book published and sold by Moses Thomas, Philadelphia, bearing the date of 1813, which makes it one hundred and fifty years old. There are many strange things in that book, which contains "Selections From Foreign Reviews and Magazines," all of which is claimed to be "the best thought of the ablest men of the age." There is an essay attacking a French authoress who was claiming an equality of intellect of the two sexes. The reviewer remarks: "Upon the whole, we do not think that a little learning is always a dangerous thing in a lady, so long as it has reference to her condition of life and the sphere of her duties."

That is as far as the world had got at that time in the education of women. About seventy years afterward, when a woman became senior wrangler at Oxford, which is the highest honor in mathematics, there began a change of opinion concerning the quality of woman's intellect.

It was maintained in the entire period by these "ablest men of the age," that the "female intellect" was entirely inferior to that of men, and that her physical structure made it impossible for her to comprehend the great questions, such as that of war. Since then a woman has written the greatest war hymn of the world.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.
