LUCKY HEINIES GOT AWAY SAFELY

WITH THE YANKS, Nov. 21.—There is pathos in the brief reports that airmen sometimes turn in regarding battles above the clouds. The best words of a great writer would hardly be more vivid than the following reports with all their military levity as they were turned in.

Capt. B reports: Combat 9:20 to 9:40 region of Sampigny—Gironville—Etang de Gironde. Combat began at 5500 meters. Fired 200 rounds from 150 to 40 yards range. Put the observer's gun out of action, then both of my guns failed. Lieut. E and S also attacked. Both Lieut. S's guns failed and Lieut. S had motor trouble. After my guns jammed I maneuvered the enemy plane, a biplane Rumpier, to within 50 meters of the ground in the region of Etang Neuf. Held him there for five minutes without being able to fire a shot and trying to bluff him into landing. Was several times in perfect position at 20 yards range. Finally the pilot realized I could not shoot, the enemy plane flew straight for its own lines. I followed to the region of Louemont at 400 meters altitude. When I turned to come home the enemy plane followed me back to our own lines, the pilot firing about 50 rounds from the forward gun without result. The Rumpier was camouflaged in green and black diamonds with white tail, the cross on tail, on upper and lower wings, number 8 in white on each side of fuselage. During latter part of combat the observer stood up facing me and as I maneuvered he would turn and point to his pilot in the direction in which to turn.

Lieut. E reports: Saw two enemy aircraft east of Bey at 4,000 meters.

Saw one enemy aircraft north of Pont-a-Mousson at 4500 meters. Over Sampigny saw biplane Rumpier. Climbed to 5500 meters and headed enemy aircraft off his lines. He turned east over Foret d'Apremont. Capt. B got under his tail while pilot was maneuvering and an opportunity came to dive under him and attack from below, which I did, firing 40 shots from 50 meters. Both guns jammed, and while clearing jams lost sight of fight in the clouds. Capt B and Lieut S were still after enemy aircraft when I left at 2,000 meters. Rumpier had white tail, green camouflage and No. 8 was painted on both sides of fuselage in white paint.

Lieut. S reports: At 9:10 engaged an enemy two-seater over Commercy at 4800 meters. Fired some 150 shots at range of from 100 to 40 meters. Enemy went into a dive and I followed, pulling up at 800 meters to fix machinegun jam. At this point of the combat my pressure system went bad, my motor stopping dead, so I was forced to land near Gironville. The enemy artillery opened fire on my machine 15 minutes after I had landed and up to the time I left had not secured a direct hit, altho the plane undoubtedly is badly damaged.

The Boche airmen who figured in this fight are regarded as "meat" and also "lucky Heinies" by the airmen. It is seldom that victory is so close and slips away so easily thru airmen's luck.

THESE LIBERTY BONDS CAREFULLY SALTED DOWN

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—When the U. S. S. San Diego was sunk last June off Fire Island, approximately \$100,000 in Liberty Bonds belonging to the crew went down with her.

learn to play ball on them is necessarily limited.

Children First

It is the opinion of this Y. M. C. A. man, who has had wide experience in playground work, that the way to introduce baseball among the French in a manner insuring success is to begin on the children. He says that a playground program, developed along the approved American lines, will give the right kind of muscular training and also stimulates the interest that eventually will popularize the American sport. On the other hand, he says that there is little chance of making baseball a go if one attempts to teach it to adults from "scratch" with the hard ball.

The attempts of a novice to hit a regulation baseball with a regulation bat are bound to be discouraging and in some cases where this has been tried, the French have come to the conclusion that they never will be

able to acquire enough skill to wallow out line drives.

On the other hand, anyone that is not blind can hit an indoor ball when thrown ordinarily. There are pitchers who have so much stuff that they achieve bigger strike-out records than the big leaguers in the outdoor game, but such men would not be selected, naturally, to teach the French how to play.

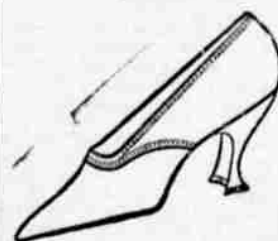
