WHOLE WHEAT BREAD

Many people have liked the mixed-
cereal bread. Most Americans, how-
ever, like most people the world over,
have an unconquerable taste for the
whole wheat.

There is a sound physiological rea-
son for it, no doubt. The corn, rice,
barley, etc., are good substitutes, diet-
etic experts say it is the uniform ex-
perience of mankind from the earliest
times that for the generality of peo-
ple, and in the long run, no other grain
or foodstuff of any kind fills the bill
so well as wheat.

We may congratulate ourselves,
then, from the standpoint of either
nutrition or palatability, that the day
of compulsory substitution is past. It
is an immediate result of peace, which
among its countless benefits unlocks
the wheat stores of India, Australia
and Argentina. With shipping once
available for long, non-military voy-
ages, those countries and their ex-
ports, those countries add their ex-
port surplus to ours for the feeding
of Europe, and diminish our former
burden of supplying nearly all the
wheat.

Our return to a whole-wheat regime
is a reward, too, of our abstinence the
past year. By our voluntary use of
substitutes we have accumulated a
wheat surplus. That surplus was to
have been held as a guarantee against
future want; but with peace assured,
we need not save it.

We shall have gone thru our war
training in vain, however, if we start
now using wheat in our old, lavish,
wasteful way. It will be a long time
before most of the civilized popula-
tions in the world have enough bread
of any kind.
