## McADOO'S RESIGNATION

The resignation of Secretary McAdoo takes from the President's official family one of the strongest men who ever graced a cabinet portfolio.

Leaving behind him a record of constructive service such as has never been attained by any of his predecessors, Secretary McAdoo is admittedly the ablest secretary of the treasury who ever served the nation as director of finances. The establishment of the federal reserve bank would alone give him a place among the greatest financiers in history, but added to this is his splendid work as financier-in-chief of the great world war and director-general of American railroads. Aside from the President himself, no member of the cabinet and no other man in public life has played a more conspicuous part or rendered greater service during the past two years than the able secretary of the treasury.

## PALESTINE AND THE ZIONISTS

There is a common impression that Great Britain, the conqueror of Palestine, intends to turn that country over bodily to the Zionists of the world for the establishment of a Hebrew republic. This, as now appears, is not precisely the plan. At any rate, it is not what the Zionists themselves ask.

"We do not demand that Palestine should be handed over to us as a package on which to stamp our label," says Louis Lipsky, executive head of the Zionist Federation of America. "I wish to make it clear to all critics of the Zionist movement that we simply want the opportunity to go to Palestine and demonstrate our superiority over the people of other nations there. When we do this, then and then only, will we demand political and economic

autonomy."

This is a fair enough proposal. It implies that the Holy Land shall be held, for a time, as an international trust, under the protection of the allied powers or a league of nations. The Zionists have already made great strides in the restoration of their sacred fatherland, even when oppressed by Turkish rule and handicapped by German interference. Given a free field there is no reason to doubt that they will prove their right to possess their ancient heritage.

Three thousand workmen in Brooklyn, N. Y., struck recently not for an eight-hour day, but against it. They want a return to longer hours. And this just as we had begun to fear the Bolsheviks. I. W. W. ideal of no hours at all!

## WILHELM AND DANIEL

The allied troops marching into the city of Metz beheld, among many pleasant things, this edifying spectacle:

On the facade of the great Metz cathedral there is a figure which originally represented the prophet Daniel. Many years ago, Kaiser Wilhelm, in his royal and religious pride, had the head taken from the statue and his own likeness substituted.

Wilhelm's head still rests, inconspicuously, on the prophet's body. But when those marching soldiers glanced up to see how the Hebraic-Teutonic effigy took their triumphal entry, they saw chains hung upon the upraised hands, and a placard hanging from them with the words, "Sie transit gloria mundi."—"So passes the glory of the world."

We turn to Shakespeare for fitting comment: "A Daniel, yea, a Daniel come to judgment!"
