GERMANY AND THE PEACE LEAGUE

If the peace conference succeeds in
its most important undertaking, which
is the organization of a permanent
League of Nations for Peace, Ger-
many will naturally be admitted—if
she qualifies.

The late enemy of all mankind can-
not expect to be received into charter
membership, along with the United
States, France, Britain and Italy,
merely on the strength of her profes-
sion that she has reformed and is now
democratic and peace-loving. The prin-
ciples and program of the league will
be established without advice from
her. If she has created an orderly
and dependable government, she will
then be admitted to membership on
terms prescribed absolutely by the al-
lied governments.

Once in the federation, we may as-
sume that there will be no discrimina-
tion among members, any more than
there is among the states of our union,
or among members of a social club.
But it is necessary that the member-
ship rules should be laid down by na-
tions that have proved themselves
champions of democracy and peace,
and that the acid test should be ap-
plied to any candidate for member-
ship whose history and antecedents
are questionable.

ing something in his native tongue."

rather than the second or third. To
move the holiday back a little farther
from Christmas would perhaps be an

sen in future for the joint commemora-
tion.
