GAVE GREAT WRITER THEME

How Patriotic Protest of Gentle-Hearted
Man Furnished Inspiration to
Joel Chandler Harris.

In one of his stories of farm life in
Georgia Joel Chandler Harris told of a
wealthy planter who wanted a few
acres of original woodland cleared near
a village in which he lived. Labor was
scarce, but he finally induced a thrif-
tless fellow in the village to do the
work—a man who had always been
honest, but a kind of dreamer and
"nec" do well."

After a few days the man came to
his employer and frankly confessed
that he could not do the work, al-
though he needed the money. Pressed
for a reason he said that the first tree
he started to cut down was hollow and
occupied by two squirrels, who made
violent complaint at the destruction of
their house. The next was the home of
a chipmunk, with a large family, and
the third was occupied by at least four
pairs of jaybirds. "That piece of
woodland is a peopled city, throbbing
with life, busy from morning until
night. It contains their homes and
families, they have built and lived
there for years and I have not the
heart to destroy what belongs to these
helpless creatures." And out of that
incident, simple but impressive as it
was, Mr. Harris drew inspiration for
one of the most graphic pictures in
all literature.—H. E. Harman, in the
South Atlantic Quarterly.
