HOLDING BACK THE BARBAR-
IANS

France is likely to make an effort
in the peace conference to establish
the Rhine as the permanent western
boundary of Germany. The armistice
gives the allies temporary control not
only of all the territory up to the
Rhine, but of the important bridge-
heads and a considerable area around
them on the east bank. It is possible
that this arrangement will stand in-
definitely, except for the return of
the bridgeheads when Germany has
fulfilled her war obligations.

The reason for such a policy is well
expressed by Gen. Mallette, the
French military critic. He holds that
the Rhine is the natural defense of
Western Europe against Germany and
that whenever the Germans have been
allowed to cross that barrier they have
made trouble. "All our misfortunes,"
he says, "all the sorrows of this war,
came about because Prussia, is mis-
tress of the German people, estab-
lished herself on the west bank of the
Rhine and was able to concentrate a
formidable army, created in a spirit
of aggression and conquest, in the
Rhine provinces and in Alsace-Lor-
raine. There must be no German sol-
diers on the left bank of the Rhine."

Alsace-Lorraine is already taken
care of. It is returned to France, and
the peace conference will make the
transfer legal and final. But what of
the Rhine Palatinate, between Lor-
raine and the Rhine? And what of
the other provinces to the north, now
a part of Prussia?

It may seem unnecessarily severe
to wrest the Palatinate from Ger-
many. It may be argued that France,
with Alsace-Lorraine, is adequately
protected, especially if Lorraine is ad-
vanced eastward a little to the banks
of the Saar. The real danger area is
the region bounded by the Moselle on
the south, the Rhine on the east and
Luxemburg, Belgium and Holland on
the west—a wedge averaging about
40 miles wide and 120 miles long,
narrowing to a point at the northern
end where the Rhine enters Holland.

The peace conference may seriously
consider making this territory a neu-
tral state, under the protection of the
allies or of the proposed League of
Nations.

HUN PEACE COMMUNIQUES

Much of the joy of life has depart-
ed since the German army bulletins
became a thing of the past. However,
if the German can preserve that same
cheery optimism and untruthfulness
concerning his peaceful pursuits
which made his war reports such de-
lightful reading, we may still have
our daily smile over news which bears
the made-in-Germany stamp.

They are the same old Germans;
and doubtless before long we shall be
reading that at their previously pre-
pared positions in workshop and roll-
ing mill, handsome presents are being
made by the Germans for their dear
brothers in Belgium; while any day
now Americans may expect word that
we are so dear to Germany's heart
that she would gladly dye for us.

Bullets Don't Stop 'Em

PARIS, Dec. 3.—An American au-
tomobile, just in from the front at-
tracted a great deal of attention on
the boulevards recently. It had been
literally riddled by machinegun bul-
lets, but was still in good running or-
der and was being used by a major.
The body looked like a kitchen col-
ander. There were 120 holes through
one side of the car and many bullets
had plowed out the other side. When-
ever the automobile halted a crowd
gathered and invariably the French
soldiers in the crowds saluted and the
civilians raised their hats when the
occupants reappeared to enter the
car.

Japan's Fleet Grows

TOKIO, Dec. 3.—Japan has greatly
augmented the number of its mer-
chant vessels on the Southern Pacific
and Indian Ocean routes. Before the
war only 500,000 tons of space was
provided by Japan, as against 3,800,
000 tons by other nations, while today
the ratio stands 800,000 to 1,300,000.
As will be noted, the total space avail-
able has shrunk from 4,300,000 tons a
year to 2,100,000.
