GOOD ROADS COMING

That good roads are bound to come
as a result of the war is the opinion
of Col. Robert H. Tyndall of the 150th
field artillery. He maintains that the
good roads of France saved her in at
least two instances. He also says that
none of the army truck drivers, con-
cerned so long overseas with getting
enormously heavy loads delivered in
record time under extremely difficult
conditions, will be willing to put up
with the road conditions so commonly
accepted in this country as inevitable.

Just as this demand for satisfactory
highways comes from France, Sec-
retary of Agriculture Houston issues
a statement to a conference of editors
of agricultural journals at Washing-
ton saying that cooperative highway
construction under the federal aid
road act must be resumed as quickly
as possible in full measure.

The immediate need of the country
is for better distribution of everything
used in building, in manufacture and
in all the affairs of life. There are
great numbers of army trucks soon
to be released from military service,
ready to dart hither and thither feed-
ing the railroads and relieving them.
For this heavy work, roads which will
stand up under it without giving way
are imperative.

From federal and state funds, to-
talling roughly, there should be about
\$75,000,000 available for expenditure
during the coming year. This, prop-
erly used, ought to build a good many
hundred miles of sound and durable
highways.

In the past, roads and canals have
been synonyms for graft and waste-
fulness. The future must see high-
way money expended with honesty
