NOTICE OF SALE OF GOVERNMENT TIMBER

Notice is hereby given that subject to the conditions and limitations of the Act of June 9, 1916 (39 Stat., 218), and the instructions of the Secretary of the Interior of September 15, 1917, the timber on the following lands will be sold Jan. 2, 1919, at 10 o'clock a. m., at public auction at the United States land office at Roseburg, Oregon, to the highest bidder at not less than the appraised value as shown by this notice, sale to be subject to the approval of the Secretary of the Interior. The purchase price, with an additional sum of one-fifth of one percent thereof, being commissions allowed, must be deposited at time of sale, money to be returned if sale is not approved, otherwise patent will issue for the timber which must be removed within ten years. Bids will be received from citizens of the United States, associations of such citizens and corporations organized under the laws of the United States or any state, territory or district thereof only. Upon application of a qualified purchaser, the timber on any legal subdivision will be offered separately before being included in any offer of a larger unit.

FOREST CAMPBELL WRITES FROM FRANCE

Tells of Meeting Albany Boys and of Trials of Government Truck Driver

Somewhere in France, Nov. 4, 1918

Dear Editor: Have just been reading an issue of your paper, dated early in September. I have read several letters from boys at the front in your paper and thought maybe you would like to hear what some more Albany boys are doing.

Kenneth McCune, Kenneth Bloom, Roy Eastburn, John Stilson, all are in the truck service. We have all been on several fronts, in the Argonne Wood and at Verdun.

A truck driver has the most varied experience of any branch of the service. When we work at all we work hard and long, generally starting at dark and driving all night, without light of any kind, over roads that have been shelled by Fritz and in a good many cases Fritz is still shelling them.

One night all truck drivers were ordered to be ready to move at once. Of course that means warm up your engine and stay by your truck. This night we had not long to wait for in a very short time we started for an ammunition dump with a long convoy of trucks. Of course at just this time it had to rain. We arrived at our ammunition dump, loaded up and started for our guns, the rain continuing all the time and the most of the men driving open cars with no cover at all from the weather. We left the ammunition dump with 14 cars and arrived at our gun positions with eight, but even that was pretty good. The rest of our cars were in the ditch along the way some place. For about a mile and a half one driver would have to go ahead of the car in order that we could keep in the road at all. At last we arrived at our gun positions at about 12 at night and were unloaded and, while we were standing up resting a bit, Bang! a French 75 tore loose right beside us and just 30 seconds later every gun of heavy calibre along the whole line opened up. Guns right beside the roads and even in the roads; some had not had time even to get into position. At 5 a. m. the infantry went over the top behind a terrific barrage and what is more they did not stop with the top but kept right on going 100 yards every ten minutes. Our guns were soon out of range and we moved to a new front.

We loaded up and waited all night for orders to move, when along comes a Hun airplane and Fritz opens up his endgate and lets us have a few, but none are close enough to do any damage, but then even the privilege of smoking is taken away from us for fear Fritz might see some of our cigarette stubs.

About 4 o'clock in the morning Fritz opens up with his long-range 88's and

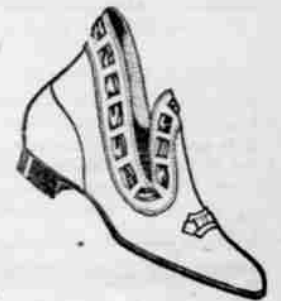

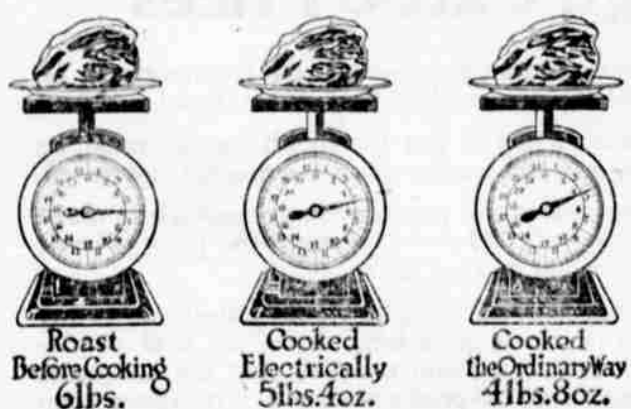
