A GREAT AMERICAN DEFEAT

If peace, no less than war, has her
victories, she also has her defeats. One
of them is the influenza epidemic that
has swept this country and has not
yet finished its ravages.

The victorious flu is already credit-
ed with 300,000 to 350,000 deaths in
the United States alone. The death
list will probably reach half a million
before the invasion is ended. Our
mortality list from the war, the larger
than most Americans expected, will
total perhaps one-eighth of that num-
ber. Our flu casualties, or cases of
illness varying in degree, are vastly
greater than all our war casualties,
and more disastrous in their effects
than the wounds of our soldiery.
