OUR BIGGEST NEED

There will be widespread agreement
with the President's dictum that "what
the country chiefly needs is that all
its means of transportation should be
developed—its railways, its water-
ways, its highways and its country-
side roads." It will probably be
agreed, too, since no wholly satisfac-
tory policy has yet appeared, that
"some new element of policy is abso-
lutely necessary."

Modern civilization depends more
on transportation than on any other
material factor. Transportation is
particularly vital in any country so
large and populous as the United
States, in order to bind all our mil-
lions together and provide them with
the means of living a common life.
Prosperity depends upon it. Progress
depends upon it. In the end, mental
and spiritual development depend on
it.

The public realizes all this more
clearly today than ever before. It is
time to find the "new element of pol-
icy," and apply it, and this was the
dominant note in the good roads meet-
ing held in Albany on December 7th.

WOMEN STILL MOBILIZED

"We pledge to our country our best
effort to prevent waste and the self-
ish use of our food reserves. We
pledge our loyal cooperation in carry-
ing out the conservation measures
suggested by the government.

"And if economy sometimes grows
irksome or if this service works un-
welcome change in our manner of liv-
ing, we will think of those who have
given their lives for their country and
of those whose homes have been de-
vasted. We will be glad to hear that
we, too, can serve in satisfying their
hunger, in renewing their courage,
and in reestablishing their homes."

This pledge was taken last week by
women's organizations throughout the
United States, representing millions
of people. It means that the women
of America are still mobilized for
this great work, which is peculiarly
within women's province—the feeding
of the world's hungry. Men can
surely do no less than cooperate with
them, and accept cheerfully whatever
small economies or superficial priva-
tions are involved in feeding Ameri-
can families amply, but without
waste, and healthfully, but without
pampering.

Would it not be an excellent plan
for the various clergymen of Albany
to submit an advance copy of their
Sunday sermons to the editor of the
Herald? If after mature considera-
tion, the subject matter appeared to
be free from words which might be
construed as advising treason, sedi-
tion or loyalty to the head of the
American peace commission, the man-
uscript could be returned with the no-
tation, "Passed by the Herald Board
of Censorship."
