THE FRENCH OVATION

"You will see in a minute what Paris
thinks of you, Mr. President."

In the above words Premier Clemenceau greeted President Wilson upon his arrival at the capital of France. Nor did Clemenceau overestimate the enthusiasm of his countrymen.

More than two million Parisians lined the streets as the Presidential car wended its way towards the palace, and the ovation given to King George and King Albert on their recent visits dwindled into insignificance beside the enthusiastic and whole-hearted welcome extended to the head of the American republic.

The demonstration in Paris was more than mere diplomatic etiquette. It was more than mere curiosity on the part of the French people. It was a genuine tribute to a statesman who has been weighed in the scales of world politics and proved his worth. "Vive Wilson," shouted the crowds, and it was echoed and re-echoed by all sorts and conditions of men—statesmen, diplomats, soldiers, and humble peasants joined in the ovation to the one man who is now looked to by the nations of the civilized world as the dominating figure at the peace table.

Moreover, it was a tribute to America—to the nation which saved France and the allied cause. It was a spontaneous outburst from the heart of France—an appreciation of America and Americans for the part which they had in bringing the war to a victorious end.

Yet while France and our other allies are proclaiming Woodrow Wilson as the man best suited by training, temperament and ability to mold the political thought and action at the greatest conference of brains ever held in the history of the civilized world, we find both little men in big places and small men in small places attempting to muddy the waters of international thought and belittle the spokesman of the American government in the greatest undertaking that was ever attempted by any man or any nation. We find men who are more politicians than patriots, men who care more for a republican president in 1920 than a peace founded upon the principles of justice, equity and fair dealing in 1918. We find men—and we have them in the senate and house of representatives—who would play the sordid game of partisan politics while the political rights, sovereignty, lives and ambitions of millions of people may depend upon whether or not our spokesman at Paris has the wholehearted and untainted backing of his fellow countrymen. It would be hard to conceive of a more inglorious role for men to play at a more glorious time and, thank God, men of this type are in the hopeless minority.
