KEEP AFTER THEM

No person having in charge any of
the great branches of war service
knows more of the romance as well
as the periphery of the German schemes
for the extension of German ideas and
German power in this country than
does A. Mitchell Palmer, alien prop-
erty custodian.

Thru Mr. Palmer's hands has passed
every bit of information regarding
alien-owned property in this country,
and under his wise and patriotic su-
pervision the enemy holdings have
been investigated, seized and, as he
calls it, "Americanized." This Ameri-
canization of senseless wood and
stone and steel consists in the confis-
cation of alien enemy property and
its sale to American interests of proved
loyalty.

Steel mills, factories, mines, land,
railway rights, steamship lines and
piers all together formed a German-
controlled interest so vast that ap-
propriately enough it was termed by
Mr. Palmer "a knife at the throat of
America." Its aim and object was to
establish German power in this coun-
try so securely that it would have suf-
ficient weight to keep us out of the
war, give Germany a fund of raw ma-
terials and manufactures to replace
those formerly obtained in European
markets, and finally when Germany
was ready for her final conquest of
America be the foundation of her tri-
umph.

Mr. Palmer is urging that this pol-
icy of "Americanization" shall not
cease with the war, for the German
hold on American industry was a men-
ace rooted more deeply than is com-
monly appreciated, and only in its
complete eradication is there safety.

These are the things that the ev-
ery-day American must understand,
must appreciate, at their full value in
order that he may fully appreciate the
completeness of the danger which has
been so narrowly averted. No pacifist
instinct, no misplaced sympathy for a
"fallen foe" is justified at all in Ger-
many's case. Her tremendous busi-
ness and industrial schemes in this
country had just one aim, the final
subjugation of America.

GERMAN JUDASES

Centuries ago Judas Iscariot, think-
ing he could save his skin and make
a little money, denied the policy which
he had previously embraced, and ac-
cused of his own safety, betrayed his
associates to whatever fate might be-
fall them.

Because he was an ignorant follow-
er, Judas was less culpable than are
those educated leaders of Germany,
the Hohenzollerns, father and son,
who have recently joined the amalga-
mated Judases of the world, actuated
by exactly the same reason as the
founder of the order.

Father and Son of Lies, these two
autocrats represent now, just as they
always have, the epitome of individual
power! Lacking their authority and
connivance, the German people could
neither have started the war nor con-
tinued it for one day along lines which
did not meet with their full approval.
It is noticeable that this precious
pair express neither sorrow nor re-
pentance. They only tell why they
were defeated. Neither one knows yet
that the true reason for that defeat
was the corrupted national conscience
of Germany, for which they are pri-
marily responsible.

If they did not like what was going
on, they had only to speak to stop it.
Failing in this, there was nothing to
prevent these "unwilling" combatants
from leaving Germany and joining the
allied forces.

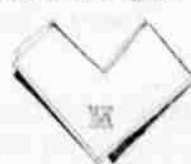

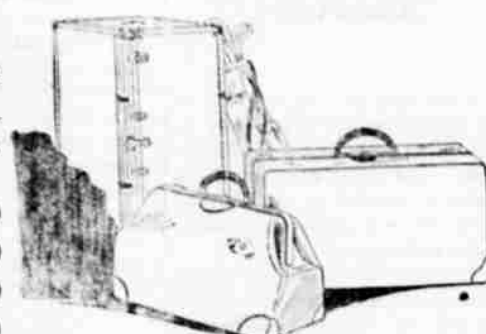
