deeper significance for us this year.
For the past four years our celebra-
tion of this day has seemed a mock-
ery. There were so many lands in
which there was no joy, no peace and
no mirth for the little folks. Belgium,
France, Serbia, Armenia, Poland—in
those countries children were suffer-
ing from cold and hunger, they were
orphaned, maimed, utterly miserable
and hopeless under the scourge of cru-
el war. In some of those regions to-
day there are no little children left
alive. We tried to remember them in
the midst of our joy and were con-
science-stricken that there was so lit-
tle we had done for them, so little at
best that we could do.

This year much is changed. The
enemy has been conquered and driven
forth. The deadly foes of sorrow and
famine are slowly being routed. There
is hope and peace, and some day again
there may be health and happiness.

In this country where war did not
touch the children with so heavy a
hand, Christmas Day finds us with
much to be thankful for and to rejoice
over. But our happiness can not be
complete and sincere if we forget the
little ones over there.

It is Children's Year in the United
States, with many forces united to
save the lives of thousands of babies,
to improve child health and to do
away with the evils of child labor.
Christmas should be the beginning of
Children's Year throughout the world.
There are undernourished bodies to
be built up to plumpness and rosi-
ness. There are starved little souls to be fed
love and fun and tenderness. There
are peace and good will to be restored
to the hearts of mankind.

Let this Christmas last all through
the year.

Faces Ahead.

regiments that had stormed the slope

sundown from the task of burying
their dead. They were two much un-
lifted men, and their eyes were shift-
ing as they made their brief but elo-
quent report.

New Trick.

A new method of fighting the U-boat

drop a depth charge as the torpedo

explosion of the torpedo or else diverts
the deadly missile from its course. This
