WHAT THE PLAIN PEOPLE WANT

President Wilson is quoted as say-
ing, in an interview printed in the Lon-
don Times, in answer to a question as
to what was the greatest purpose of
the peace conference:

"I think the plain man in the street
can answer as well as I can. The
plain people of all nations are now
looking with anxious expectation to-
ward Versailles, and I am sure they
are asking themselves this one ques-
tion:

"Will there be found enough of
wisdom and purpose among the states-
men there assembled to create a safe-
guard against future wars?"

Anyone who asks the man in the
street anywhere in this country or in
any allied country is likely to find cor-
roboration of the President's state-
ment. Those who doubt can easily de-
termine the matter for themselves by
asking enough men or women to get
a dependable line on popular opinion
on their neighborhoods.

Those who have managed this war,
on the allied side, have professed all
along that they were fighting for the
liberty and safety of the "plain peo-
ple." We are now about to see wheth-
er they will make good their prom-
ises.

The plain people have fought and
won the war. The plain people are
ready to pay in money as they have
already paid in pain and grief. But
they demand that they shall be dealt
with honestly. They have fought, as
they think, to make war impossible
hereafter. They want their representa-
tives at the peace conference to work
out a practicable way and thus make
Will the representatives of the vari-
ous powers at Versailles have
good their victory,
enough wisdom and enough honesty to
give the people what they want and
expect? If not, those statesmen and
their governments will have a hard
reckoning when the plain people, de-
ceived and disappointed, call them to
account.

KEEP THE BONDS

Carter Glass, newly appointed sec-
retary of the treasury, finds it nec-
essary to issue a sober warning to
the holders of Liberty Bonds.

"Some people," he says, "seem to
feel that they are under no further
obligation to retain these bonds and
they are selling them and using the
money for unnecessary purposes or
exchanging them for other securities
of doubtful value. So long as the
United States needs to sell bonds,
those who hold the present issues
should not dispose of them except
under the spur of urgent necessity. They
have invested in the best security in
the world and it is both to their own
interest and to that of their govern-
ment that these securities be retained."

The temptation to dispose of the
bonds is unusually strong at this sea-
son of the year. It is yielded to all
the more easily because of the feeling
that the war is over and the need is
past.

This attitude is bad for the bond-
holder, bad for business and bad for
the government. It means a relaxa-
tion of the thrift that has been one
of the finest and most useful of our
war-born virtues. It means a lower-
ing of bond prices, disturbing the se-
curities market and unsettling the
credit system. It means added diffi-
culties put in the way of the war
loans that must be floated next year.

It is justifiable, of course, to sell
one's bonds in a real business or per-
sonal emergency. But every bond-
holder should understand that the
same motives that induced him to buy
securities should impel him to hang
onto them as long as possible.

One thing that will help Germany
to pay her war indemnities is the fact
that she won't have to support a navy.
