THE SURUGATED ENGLISH

Americans have a tendency to
speak of Great Britain, or even the
British Empire, as England. That
tendency is based on the traditional
power of England, and the belief that
she absolutely dominates the group of
races and nations she is associated with.

The domination may be there, but
if so it is not much in evidence at
present. It has been pointed out very
many times during the war that most
of the men holding responsible posi-
tions in the British government or
army have not been; Englishmen at
all. Now the London Evening Stand-
ard shows that England is still less
in evidence at the peace table.

In a conference that will settle the
fate of Great Britain for generations
to come, the Standard explains, the
country is represented by one Welsh-
man (Lloyd-George), four Scotsmen,
(Mr. Balfour, Sir Eric Geddes, Mar-
shal Haig and Admiral Wemyss), one
Scottish Canadian (Bonar Law), one
Jew (Lord Reading) and one English-
man (Lord Milner). A commentator
adds the further information that this
sole English representative was born
in Germany, as was his father before
him.

An Englishman laments: "We are
governed by the Welsh, preyed for by
the Scotch and then preyed upon by
the Irish."

The latest German estimates give
the number of German soldiers killed
in the war as about 2,000,000, of whom
1,200,000 are Prussians.

dead are said to total a little less than
1,000,000 and the French dead 1,400,-
000. These are appalling losses, to
countries of such small population as

many proportionately as Germany.
But the German cost is quite heavy
enough to sober and sadden those
German imperialists who plunged so
joyfully into the great adventure, and
to persuade the German people that
the war as a national business does
not pay.

British are worthy rivals.
