JUVENILE GARDENERS

There is a little girl in Fairbanks,
Tex., who raised enough vegetables
last season by her own efforts, in a
half acre garden to put up 1,000 cans
of tomatoes, 150 cans of beans, 60
cans of peas, 78 cans of tomatoes and okra
and 50 cans of sweet potatoes, mak-
ing 1,418 cans altogether. They were
of such fine quality, too, that they
won praise and prizes in a county fair.

There is a 14-year old boy in Berea,
O., who has won the reputation of
being the best potato grower in the
state. He raised 47.75 bushels of
spuds on one-tenth of an acre. He
made a profit of \$78. That would
mean 477 bushels an acre, and a profit
of \$780 an acre.

The growup gardeners and farm-
ers certainly have to look to their law-
rels these days. The rising generation
seems to know more about raising food
than father and grandfather ever did.

PLANNING THE TEMPLE OF
PEACE

Balfour, the British statesman, said
when the armistice was signed:

vain if the two English-speaking peo-

of humanity that no future genera-
tions will ever see destroyed."

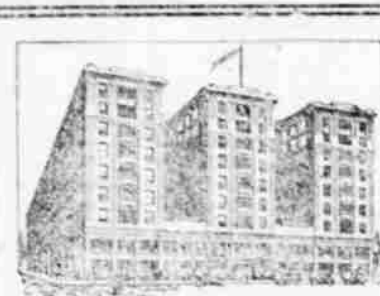
