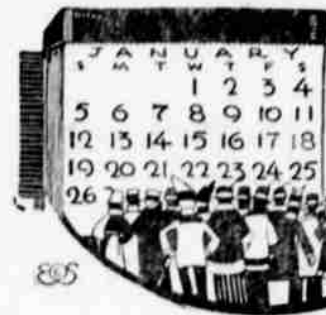

# CARD GAMES STOP AS MINISTER PREACHES

Son of Mrs. A. C. Jenkins Tells of Life in France Since Armistice

The following letter was received this week by Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Jenkins from their son, who is now in France:

La Frette, Fr., Dec. 17, 1918. Dear Mother: The mail has just been called off and I was lucky enough to get two letters, one being from Dad and the other from a college girl. The latter contained several cakes of chewing gum, which were appreciated. We are billeted in an out of the way country town, so very few of the little luxuries are obtainable.

However, I have had several good beefsteaks and French fried spuds. Now that the war is over we have very little to do, which naturally is a breeder of trouble among a large company of men. However, to offset that we have to drill about three hours every day, which is just about enough

to keep us busy here.

I believe I told you about this and other chateaux. The other day while out on a walking pass I found several very beautiful structures and fortunately there was some postcard pictures of them for sale in the village.

I am using my messkit lid for a writing desk this time, but it is not the best in the world for that purpose even though it serves me well at chow time.

There are all kinds of rumors as to when we will move and where we will go. I guess eventually we will land in the U. S. but do not know just how soon.

I learned that the 69th Art., was also billeted somewhere near Bordeaux but unless I happen to meet somebody who knows exactly their location it is almost like hunting a needle in a haystack. Some of the fellows think that the 69th and 49th will be sent home together. I have not met anyone from Albany or its vicinity since leaving Stevens. There are several fellows from Portland in the battery and one from Harrisburg but that is the nearest home.

We are pretty well fixed now in our billet. The barn is a large one and although only supposed to have 75 men

we have nearly 140 here. At present we are sleeping on bed sacks filled with cork shavings. It at least is a dry place to sleep and not quite so bad as I have had.

The farmers around here are now busy trimming up the grapevines in their vineyards, some of which, by the way, are quite large. In fact most of the hills and valleys are covered with them. I am reminded of the hop yards of Oregon because the vines are trained upon wires similar to the above-mentioned, except they are not so high. Probably the strangest sight is that of a large ox hitched to a plow or two-wheeled cart. The other day I was watching a peasant plowing in a field. It appeared to me to

be a very slow and tiresome job because the old ox would take one step and stop. The peasant would yell something and prod him with the goad—then the old boy would take another step. However, they seem to make progress.

You have probably heard of the extensive use of wine by the French people. Well, anyway, I have a hunch as to the reason why they don't drink water. A British Red Cross chemist told me that the water in France was almost saturated with chalk, which is very hard on the kidneys. I never did drink much water, anyway, so have little fear of it.
