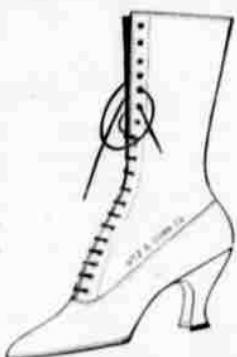

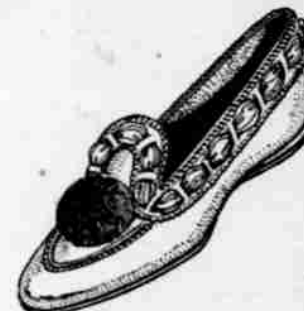
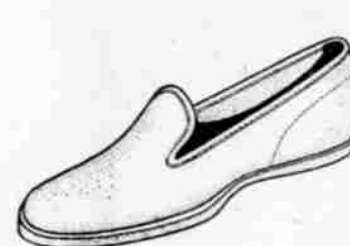

Geo. Crawford Tells of Life in France

The following letter has been received from Geo. Crawford, who is now serving in the American army in France:

Lussac, France, Dec. 11th, 1918.
Dear folks: Started out to drill this afternoon and was rained out so am writing to you to pass the time. Monday was payday and you can still see the effects; a few games of blackjack and poker. Some boys drink their pay all up in two days and others

bank it. I have my first game to play in the army. It is a good lesson for many boys.

Am billeted in an old stone barn with dirt floors. We had stoves; then they took them away from us as they expected to move us any day. Also wooden frames for beds, but we have them back again now.

We don't know when we will leave here. We hope before the 1st of Feb. Sure will be a happy bunch when we get started. The old pond is sure rough at present. We have two American daily papers, New York Herald and Chicago Tribune, and an American edition of the Petit Gironde. We are able to keep up with the outside world.

This place is so dark we have to light a candle to see to write. Am in the haymow. Make extra de ladder. All Albany boys in this regiment are in good shape. A regiment of Oregon draft just came in from Cal.; is 12 kilometers from us now. Haven't seen any of them yet. Some of our boys was over and saw Asa Eastburn. We don't get any passes out of our regimental area. After we are here four months we are supposed to get a seven-day furlough. We have no liberty like we had in the states. We are checked every night after 9 o'clock. Not allowed to buy any eats from the French but the boys come in with large teabone steaks—I don't

know where they get them but they sure are good. A loaf of bread (lo pain) looks like a stick of cordwood; it is wholewheat and rye and dark, but very wholesome. They never wrap the bread up in paper, just take it under your arm or over your shoulder. Bicycles here by the million and costs about \$100 apiece.

Must close; will write more next Sunday. Love to all.
