Meat Price May Be Up for Years

LONDON, Jan. 15.—Peace will not bring cheaper meat or more of it. Wartime prices are likely to continue for several years after the war is formally ended and food controllers are memories. Prices may go even higher. Meanwhile millions of families in the U. S. and Europe will be forced to continue meatless meals and days and weeks.

It is the after the war task of the allied food conference, composed of the food controllers of America and allied nations, to prevent a worldwide scramble for food in the U. S. and other countries after peace is signed.

After the war price soaring is more to be feared than war profiteering.

Practically all European countries are absolutely without fats and will have to be supplied by the United States insofar as that is possible. In Germany the fat ration was two ounces a week at the close of the fighting. Scandinavia has no bacon nor pork. Only in Denmark is the butter supply adequate. Holland, France and Italy are short of all fats. Milk is short in England and non-existent in Germany, Austria and Hungary, while Sweden, Denmark, Holland, France, Italy and Switzerland have only short supplies.

Control of meat prices is more difficult than those of other foods because of the difficulty of increasing the supply. This can be done only when the herds are increased. Meanwhile the nations will be bidding for American beef, which will cause steep prices in Yankee land.

FRENCH COLORS GO WELL ON GERMAN UNIFORMS

STRASSBURG, Jan. 17.—German uniforms and French tricolors were not made to go on the same man, yet they are a common sight in the Rhineland, as the Alsations return from bondage in the German army. The first thing an Alsatian did when he got to liberated territory was to buy a set of red, white, and blue colors.
