SABBATH DAY IN DISPUTE

Really No Definite Information as to When Its Observance Had Its First Institution.

There is no definite information as to when the observance of the first day of the week was substituted by the Christians for that of the seventh day, the ancient Jewish Sabbath. It undoubtedly arose among the earlier practices of the Christian church, and was regarded as the fittest day to be held sacred, because in the words of one of the fathers, "it is the first day in which God changed darkness, and the same day, also, Jesus Christ, our Savior, rose from the dead." The several references in the New Testament to the Lord's day, and to the "first day of the week," will, of course, be borne in mind. Various additional reasons taken from the Old Testament were advanced by others of the early fathers in support of the observance of this day. The first law, either ecclesiastical or civil, by which the sabbatical observance of Sunday is known to have been ordained is an edict of Constantine, A. D. 321, forbidding all work but necessary husbandry on the already "venerable Sunday." In the Theodosian code it is enjoined that "on Sunday, rightfully designated by our ancestors as the Lord's day, all lawsuits and public business shall cease." Since the ninth century Sunday has been a thoroughly established institution in Christian countries as a day of rest and religious exercises, and one exempt from any occupations of purely secular character, except such as were necessary.

FAREWELL ADDRESS OF ITALY'S SECRETARY OF AVIATION TO AMERICANS

A modest but impressive ceremony took place shortly ago in Rome, at the general commissariat for aviation. The American soldiers who were training as pilots at the Aviation School of Foggia and whose courses were interrupted owing to the happy ending of the war, were passing thru Rome on their way to America via France, and the Hon. Eugenio Chiesa, secretary of aviation, desired to receive them in order to wish them bon voyage. The daring young men assembled in a large room of the commissariat, and the Hon. Chiesa addressed them as follows:

"I am happy and sad at the same time in seeing you leave us. Happy, because you go back to your own homes with a halo of triumph, with the satisfaction that your country has made victory for right and civilization sure. Sad, because I am going to lose you whom I was accustomed to look upon as my adopted sons and who were bound to us by such ties of comradeship that seemed they would never end. You now return to your great country, to which Italy owes so much for the help given in this war: men, money, material. This brotherly assistance from America, Italy will never forget and not you shall be the last to have a claim to our gratitude, you who offered your daring youth to defend in the skies of Italy the cause of justice. Of this gratitude let the war service ribbon of our army be the sincere testimony, the ribbon which the government authorizes you to wear. You also, in returning to your country, should carry with you a grateful memory of Italy, who has loved you and has been proud of you as of her own sons.

"I am too old to hope to see the fruits of the new times which now begin; you will see and you will gather

them. Goodbye, bon voyage, good luck."

These words, pronounced by the Hon. Chiesa, with trembling voice, were received with a long and sincere applause. In leaving them the Hon. Chiesa shook hands with every one of the American aviators.

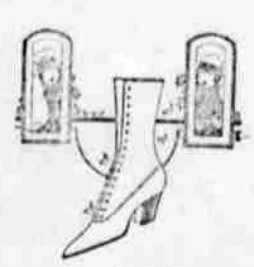
