DEMOCRACY IN RHODE ISLAND

The Rhode Island legislature is considering the abolition of the property qualification for voting. Most Americans are surprised to learn that any discrimination of this sort exists in the United States.

As a matter of fact, property qualifications used to be the rule rather than the exception. The newer states know little about them, but the original states nearly all had them.

This provision seems particularly intolerable when applied to soldiers coming home from the war. Surely, it is argued, those men have a right to full citizenship privileges if any body has, particularly if their apparent poverty is due to the fact that the government owes them several months salary.

Switzerland Surely Has Earned Right to That Title From War-Stricken Nations Surrounding Her.

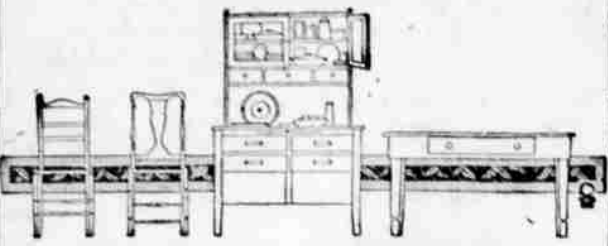
Since the battle of Morgarten in 1315 Switzerland has blazed the trail toward human freedom as the "Good Samaritan" of war-stricken Europe.

A report by the department of agriculture shows the output has increased more than half in the last two years.

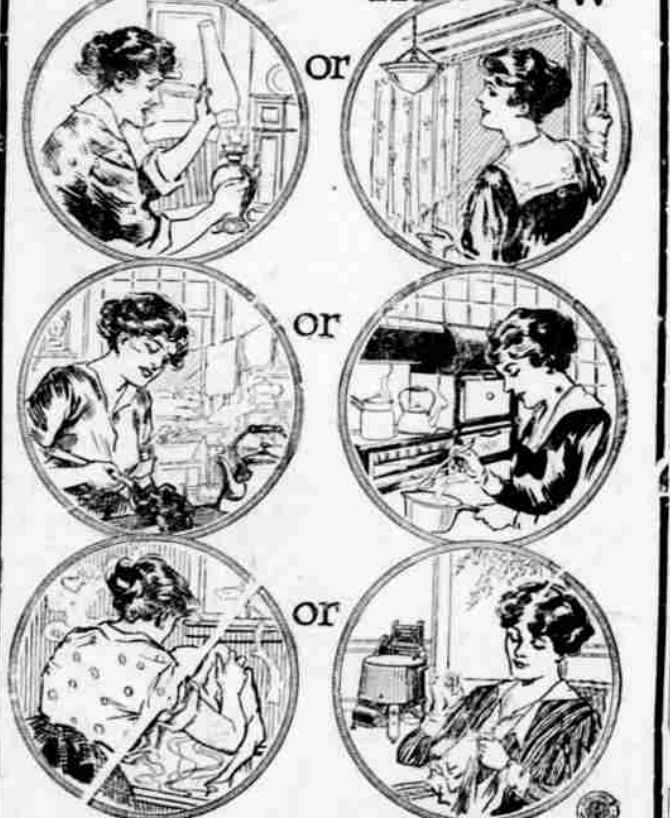
