RICHES IN URUGUAY WAIT FOR DEVELOPER

MONTEVIDEO, Jan. 22.—Interest
in Uruguayan manganese is being re-
awakened among capitalists of Great
Britain and the United States, and
there is a growing belief that re-
construction activities in the western
hemisphere will require development
of the vast deposits of this valuable
metal existing in this country.

Manganese is largely used in manu-
facture of glass and chemicals. Ger-
man and British capital has done
about all that has been done in the
manganese exploitation that has been
carried on in this country, and prac-
tically nothing has been done since
the war started.

Revival of the chemical industry in
America is looked upon as a hopeful
sign by Uruguayan residents who want
to see the country's resources develop-
ed.

Lack of transportation facilities has
been the greatest difficulty to be sur-
mounted in bringing the widely scat-
tered manganese deposits into produc-
tion. This handicap has kept unpro-
ductive two large hills, almost solid

manganese ore throughout, situated in
the department of Rivera. It is es-
timated that 80,000,000 tons of the
valuable metal could be removed from
these deposits by open cuts, with
steam shovels. English capital is
largely interested in the company
holding concessions covering these
manganese hills. The company has
been inactive, the holding the rights
for several years, because it has been
unable to overcome the handicaps im-
posed by lack of railroads to the de-
posits, scarcity of fuel, and scarcity of
timber.

WHY WAS WHALEN LEFT OUT OF BRITISH BOUT?

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—Johnnie
Bull has something left to worry about
since the American and English scrap-
pers brawled it out in a series of bat-
tles recent in England. While Amer-
ican fighters were defeated on points
by their English opponents, they left
a mark and a well-rooted fear that all
is not as it should be even with the
heavy end of the affair resting on
their side of the calendar.

For instance, it is well realized in
England, now as well as in America,
that Richie Mitchell did not uphold his
end of the game as he should have and
as he was expected to. On the Amer-
ican side of the pond feeling is that
Billy Whalen, St. Paul, is the man
who should have been selected to be
the lightweight entrant.

Mitchell, fancy, swift and deadly in
precision, is not a puncher and does
not, for that reason, carry the im-
pression in a short three-round affair
that a harder fighting man would. He
was defeated cleanly and unexpectedly
by a man about whom very little is
known. In the elimination contests
both Whalen and Mitchell won all
their bouts, but when it was proposed
to pit Whalen against Mitchell the
idea was met with a refusal and Mit-
chell was peremptorily selected. What
had previously knocked out the best
welterweight England could trot out
for the competitions.

Returning sailors have declared that
Mitchell's defeat was clear and merit-
ed, but point an accusing finger at a
former St. Paul newspaper writer
named Shave, who established himself
in the American corner and declined to
allow any other seconds to handle the
fighters. His advice, it is declared,
was very bad, and Mitchell's defeat is
attributed to his giving heed to Shave
rather than to his own lack of ability.

Whalen was returned to the United
States, severely disappointed because
of his failure to meet an opponent in
the championships. He has been box-
ing four years in the U. S. and never
had been defeated. He soon will be
mustered out of the service and ex-
pects to begin boxing soon, largely
with a view to bringing about a meet-
ing with Mitchell's conqueror.

Great Men of Small Stature.

Aristotle, who for 2,000 years held
sway over the world of thought, was
a slender man, with small eyes and
a shrill, stammering speech. Athan-
asius, who at the council of Nice was
the most potent spirit, was a man of
very small stature—a dwarf rather
than a man, but of almost angelic
beauty of face and expression. Gregory
VII, perhaps the mightiest of
the Roman pontiffs, who dethroned
sovereigns, was a diminutive man, and
so were Canute and the great Conde.

Voltaire, the literary autocrat of the
eighteenth century, was one of the
thinnest and most spectral of human
beings. Robespierre and Marat, lead-
ers of the French revolution, were far
below the average stature. Robespierre
was only five feet two or three in, and
Marat less than five feet. Napo-
leon Bonaparte was also a man of
small stature.
