ATHLETE IS NOW VINDICATED

War Has Proved That Sensible Devotion to Sports and Games Was Time Well Spent.

Much more solid before the war in preparation of the young man who devoted himself to athletics, remarks the Louisville Courier-Journal. His early death was prophesied by the coaching staff of a fellow who took his exercise with his right elbow and his recreation at bar and cabaret. Whenever an athlete died his funeral development was set down as the cause of his untimely end.

It has been made plain by the war that the athletic youth is the pre-war youth to fight the enemy. It never was proved that he was less able than others to fight life's battles in the figurative sense of the phrase, or that he died sooner than the round-punched, soft-armed, flat-legged man.

In the army and in the navy athletic sports and games are encouraged, promoted, valued. Swimming, tennis, boxing, rowing, football, are regarded as being worth more than the time that is devoted to them. Athletes who are supplied and well set up, as well as young and courageous, are the most promising contingents. It has been found that the "flat" hands of the man who has ridden to battle are as valuable in handling a machine as they are in taking a spirited horse over the hounding fields and over fences. Physical training of every sort is a good asset for the young man, and how much more easily the combat date who is footy or beyond has lived himself for military service if he has kept up since college days the habit of exercise and out-of-door life.

The tradition of the East, which so often has proved full of historical meat, sets down Damascus as the oldest city on earth still inhabited by man. It was a capital before Abraham. The old Babylonian ideograph indicating Damascus has been translated "fortress of the Amorites" and there is ample reason for admitting this rendering. Thus Damascus becomes the stronghold of the legendary first inhabitants of Syria reputed to have been as tall as cedars, and so set down in the Bible. Their name occurs in the first Babylonian inscriptions, dating back to 2100 B. C.

WOMAN LEGISLATOR PAYS SOUTH TRIBUTE

Mrs. Alexander Thompson Delivers Splendid Address at Jackson Club Banquet

Mrs. Alexander Thompson, state representative from Waco county, paid an eloquent tribute to the patriotism of the South in an address which she delivered at the Jackson Club banquet held in Portland recently. The address is in part as follows:

We hear the phrase, "a Southern democrat," very frequently nowadays, always as a mark of reproach and contumely. Personally, I want to say that I have never yet felt called upon to apologize for being a Southern democrat. I was born a Southern democrat, and I could not if I would, and I would not if I could, forget the story of the glory of our men of the South who did their part in building up this nation; and I am here tonight as an American and as a Southerner to pay my tribute to the American flag, the flag of the South as well as the North. My people and my family helped to make this flag, and though they fought against it in the '60s, they accepted the result in good faith and came back into the Union, and no section of the country today is more loyal to that flag than the solid South. Our Southern fathers helped to build this country and plant the seeds of liberty on these shores.

When in the course of events it became necessary for the struggling colonies lying along the Atlantic seaboard to declare for liberty from English rule, a Southern man, Thomas Jefferson, wrote the Declaration of Independence, that immortal document that Gladstone said was "the most wonderful work ever struck off at a given time by the brain and purpose of man."

When the continental armies needed a man to lead them in a seven years' war for freedom from British rule, a Southern man came forth from the Old Dominion, and the gleaming sword of George Washington gave the young republic a fixed place among the nations of the world.

When there seemed need of a document or agreement which should be the expression of a compact of union between these sovereign states, again Virginia, a Southern State, furnished the man of the hour, and James Madison wrote the Constitution of the United States, that marvel of wisdom and statesmanship which through all the years that have followed has proved

ed sufficient for all conditions that have arisen.

In 1812 when this young republic was again plunged into war with England, the man whose name we honor tonight, Andrew Jackson of Tennessee, led his troops to victory, and was later rewarded by the highest honor within the gift of the people.

During our war with Mexico in 1846, our American soldiers followed the standards of three southern men, Zachary Taylor, Robert E. Lee and Jefferson Davis, until the stars and stripes waved in glory over the towers of the Montezuma.

When we come to speak of the war between the states, we pass over the differences which caused this terrible struggle. It is enough to say that the South, no less than the North, believed in the justness of its cause, and that the war of the '60s proved one thing conclusively—that to the armies of the Confederacy was due the credit of demonstrating the utter impossibility of ever dissolving this Union. When we consider that 600,000 soldiers with fighting blood such as these men possessed, and commanded by such a matchless leader as Robert E. Lee, failed to separate the states, we see that the demonstration was complete and no one else will ever attempt it.

War is a dreadful thing, and much as it is to be deplored, the war with Spain in 1898 was in some respects a blessing to the United States. It proved for all time to the North and to the world, that the South was in the Union to stay—that this country was our country—that Old Glory was our flag, and that if need be we would lay down our lives to defend it, which we did. When the call to arms was sounded, the sons of the men who had followed Lee and Jackson, promptly stepped to the front and answered, "Ready." Winfield Scott Schley, a

Southern man, was put in command of the flying squadron and rendered conspicuous service at Santiago. Little Joe Wheeler of Georgia, the famous Confederate cavalry general, was called the "Wizard of the Saddle" during the Spanish-American war, and Hobson of Alabama sunk the Merrimack to block the enemy—heroes all—Southerners all—and all good loyal Americans! If the South lost the right to claim this in the '60s, she regained that privilege in the late '90s. And if anything else were needed to cement the ties of friendship between the two great sections of this country, the great world war which has just ended has wiped out all supposed differences forever. On every battle-
