Mr. and Mrs. John Carnegie received the following letters from their son, Claude C. Carnegie, who is now in Germany with the third section of the second Canadian, D. A. C.

Somewhere in Germany, Dec. 7, 1918
Dear Mother—Just a few lines to let you know 'all well' and you can see we are in Germany; arrived this side of the frontier today.

We had some trip thru Belgium and also we had considerable rain we are still on the job.

At present we are staying with a family where the man of the house is an old soldier, with an Iron Cross ribbon on his chest.

This is a very desolate-looking country; mountains or hills and mud but we can stand it and live in hopes of getting something better in the near future.

I received your letters of Nov. 4th and 9th a few days ago; was glad to

Siegburg, Germany, Dec. 15, 1918.

By the way, who did you send the draft to in London to send me a fruit cake? Did you ever stop to think that the folks in London have a hard time getting the stuff for a fruit cake?

I was sure sorry to hear of Dora's misfortune and by what I hear the flu is bad in most of Canada and in fact over the whole world.

I received my first Xmas present this morn, from the Chicago Portrait Co. It was a check for 53 frs. Also a good letter.

News is scarce around here, so will call this off and write Alvin.
