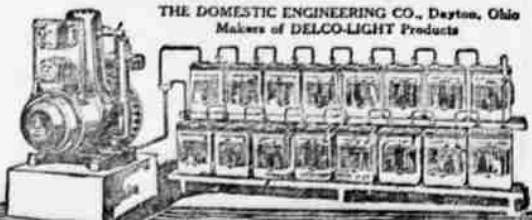

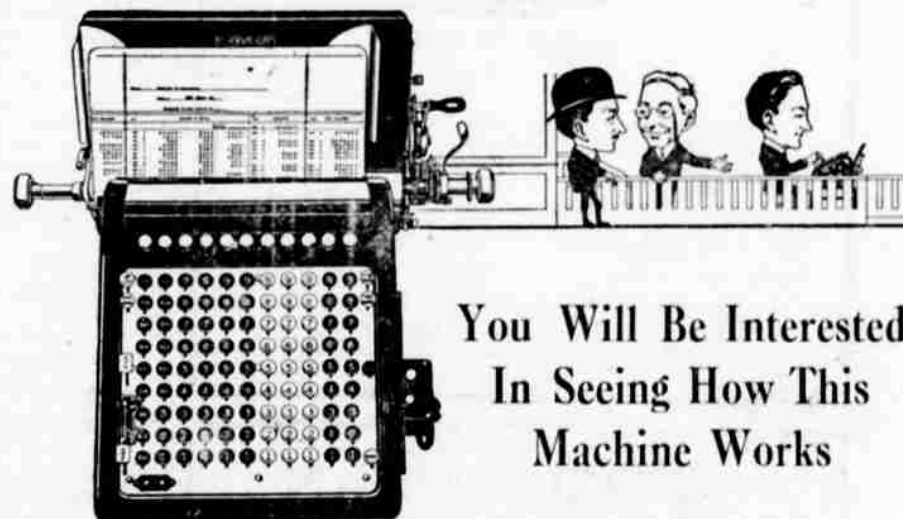
certificates will begin at the usual time in the afternoon.
