Albany Boy Enjoys

French Summer Resort

Sergeant Cecil B. Conn of Battery C, 69th artillery, writes an interesting letter to Miss Elsie Hoffman telling of his trip to a French summer resort. He also praises Uncle Sam for the treatment given the soldiers and tells of the good work of the Y. M. C. A.

The letter follows:
Canterets, France, Jan. 6th, 1919.
Dear Elsie: You will no doubt be a little surprised to see that I have a new address for a few days, and to explain where I am. Well, I will try to explain it to you and let you know where I am.

Before the war was over a soldier every so often was allowed a leave to go to some leave area for a rest from military duty. Since the armistice was signed they have opened up new leave areas for the troops that were in training, and as I have been over here long enough to be entitled to visit one of these areas, I am doing it now as I had a good chance to come.

Canterets is a big French summer resort in the Pyrennes mountains, only about nine miles from the Spanish border. It is a very pretty place situated in a pretty little valley right up in the mountains. The altitude here is 925 metres, a metre if you don't know is a little better than 32 inches.

I will enclose you some postcards of some of the beauty spots here and near here. These mountains are full of beautiful scenery both natural and hand-made. I wish that you could be here to go with me to see these sights for they are certainly wonderful.

Uncle Sam is certainly fine to us on a trip like this. It is really more than I expected and a trip I'll never forget. All our expenses are paid

while we are here. We live in French hotels and have the best of everything and Uncle Sam pays for it. He also pays our railroad fares both coming and going.

It is useless to say that the Y. M. C. A. is here; you could tell that from the stationery, and wherever the soldiers are over here you find the Y. M. C. A. with him, they have beautiful quarters that are certainly fine. It is a big building; I suppose it was used for a club of some kind before the war. There is a fine big theater in the same building and they furnish a program of some kind every evening and it is all free of charge. It is certainly grand. I can't tell it all in one letter—it would take too long and too much paper.

Today I made two long hikes up in the mountains, one before dinner and one this afternoon. This morning I only went up to the snow line but this afternoon I went in a different direction and went away up in the snow. The mountains are all covered with snow now and they sure are beautiful. I feel the effects of my hikes tonight, but I'm going again in the morning or afternoon.

I have to make every minute count for I am only here for five days and I want to see as much as I can. I don't mind the snow and cold at all; it is fine.

Three of us came from our battery, our first sergeant, supply sergeant and myself. There will be about 25 more come in a day or so.

Le left Luxac Saturday morning and arrived here yesterday afternoon about 4 p. m. We stopped overnight in a city named Bayonne, had a good time there.

Well, I must close for this time.
