**ALBANY BOY IS WITH FIRST U.S. TROOPS AT RHINE**

C. M. STEVENS ENJOYS SIGHTS IN EUROPE; GERMAN RAILROADS WELL EQUIPPED

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\* HAVE YOU A LETTER? \*

\* Send in your letters from soldiers and sailors abroad, or interesting letters from boys in cantonments in this country. Letters describing battles or scenes in France and occupied Germany are of timely interest. \*

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Private C. M. Stevens, Co. E, 37th Engineers, is enjoying his travels in France, Luxembourg and Germany. In a letter written December 16 from Coblenz, Germany, to his father, J. H. Stevens, a local railroad man, he describes the transportation facilities of the domain of the ex-Kaiser and writes interestingly of the country.

"Since I wrote last I have been through a bunch of country," he writes. "We left Clermont en Argonne, passed through Verdun, Etain, Alancy-Lorraine, Luxembourg, Wittlich, Mochel and arrived today in Coblenz, Germany. The people welcomed us everywhere. The country we passed through is very beautiful. As soon as the fighting district was passed the cities and towns were neat and clean.

"Northern France has many large mining cities and some good farming country but the finest little country of all is Luxembourg. The people there are fine—treated as well and many can speak English. It is a neutral country and although the Germans went through on the way to France they did no harm to the country. The Americans are treating them the same way.

Luxembourg is Modern City.

"Luxembourg is the capital and is as fine a city as any of our modern cities. Streetscars, movies, etc. Everything is very expensive and some things hard or impossible to buy. Soap and chocolate are scarce and everyone there asks the American soldiers for these.

"After we left Luxembourg we hit out for Coblenz. Our duties were to see that the railroads were safe for the passage of our army of occupation. Co. E, 37th engineers, has the honor of being the first U. S. troops in Germany and the first into Coblenz.

"We went into Germany along the Moselle river and this certainly is a fine country. Vineyards on all of the hills and clear to the top. Some hills are so steep that it was necessary to terrace them.

Food is Plentiful

"On the way in we stopped at night in the German towns and were billeted with German families. They have plenty to eat and are not starving by a long way. I used to buy my supper and breakfast from them and usually had potatoes, black bread, jam, coffee, butter and sometimes pork. Of course this was in the small places and food is more scarce in the large cities. I always insisted on paying for my meals although the pay did not want to take pay. The bill was arranged for by our government.

"I sent postcards home from nearly everywhere I passed through except Coblenz. I have some of Coblenz but will bring them with me.

Meets K. C. Official

"One of the first Americans I met in Coblenz was Thomas McLaughlin, supreme warden, K. of C., who is a personal friend of Will Barrett.

"Although we carry arms here at all times and usually travel in pairs or threes no one seems to dislike us but are just the opposite—wave and cheer us.

"The German railroads are nearly perfect. The roadbed is better than any road the states have. Heavy rail, steel ties and burro ballast, and some very large locomotives.

German Railroads Good

"I was talking with a German locomotive engineer and their black system and train rules are very much like ours. I told him I was a railroad man and he gave me a fine leather belt he got from a German soldier. It has a buckle with 'Gott Mit Uns' stamped on it.

"I also have a German officer's spiked helmet. I gave a girl a small bar of Y. M. C. A. soap for it. Also have several German buttons and a very neat badge a Luxembourg brakeman gave me. It has the Luxembourg crown, wings, a wheel and arrows—got this for a sack of Bull Durham."
