WAYWARD GIRLS ARE SAVED BY WORKERS

Splendid Results Achieved by Florence Crittenton Home; Unfortunates Cared for

With the departure Wednesday of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Bristow for Portland Albany is losing two active workers along business and sociological lines. While Mr. Bristow will continue to manage the plant of the Albany Furniture factory, his continued residence in the city will be missed.

Mrs. Bristow is president of the State Board of Managers of the Florence Crittenton Home, of Portland, and has occupied that position for the past six years. She has been associated with the rescue work of the home for many years previous to heading the organization and has seen much good done in the way of starting wayward girls and women back on the right path.

Girls Trained to Work

The home is nonsectarian and is glad to receive any girl or woman in need of a home. Medical care, schooling, vocational training in domestic science, sewing or along other lines to fit girls to earn money and take care of themselves is given free. The home is supported by state and private funds and is in charge of a competent and sympathetic superintendent and nurse. Every girl who is taken into the home is protected and no names are given to the public. There are usually from 15 to 35 girls in the home at a time and during the last few years a large number have been cured for.

Results Are Obtained

In the 14 years that Mrs. Bristow has been associated with the work but two girls have gone back on the home and persisted in living the wrong kind of a life. Many pitiful tales are told of cases referred to the home, and many happy results are reported after the care and kindness of the women in charge has been exerted upon the unfortunates.

The weakness of the law in dealing with minors and juvenile offenders is being remedied at the present session of the legislature and Mrs. Bristow is confident that Multnomah county will be given a juvenile judge who will be able to devote his entire time to the work.

taxed 3 per cent of the sale price and other automobiles except tractors, 5 per cent. Tires bear a 5 per cent tax. Pianos, organs (other than pipe organs), piano players, graphophones and talking machines with records pay 5 per cent. Sporting goods of all kinds 10 per cent; cameras 10 per cent; chewing gum 3 per cent; candy 5 per cent; photographic films and plates 5 per cent; guns and shells 10 per cent; hunting knives 10 per cent; dirks, daggers, sword canes and still-ettes 100 per cent.

Other Things Taxed

Electric fans, 5c; thermos bottles, 5 per cent; meerschaum pipes, 10 per cent; slot machines, 5 per cent; liveries, riding and hunting habits 10 per cent; articles made of fur, 10 per cent; yachts and motorboats 10 per cent; toilet soaps, 3 per cent; sculpture, paintings and antiques, 5 per cent; woolen rugs, domestic or imported, 10 per cent.

GERMANS AND POLES IN SILESIA AGREE

German Empire.

The assembly, composed of 421 members, of whom 34 are women, was elected by direct popular vote of the whole people, and is decidedly socialist in complexion. The membership is divided among the political parties thus:

Majority Socialists 164
 Christian People's Party 88
 Democrats 77
 German National Party 34
 Minority Socialists 24
 German People's Party 23
 Guelphs 4
 Bavarian Peasants League 4
 Wurttemberg Bourgeois Party 2
 Peasants' and Workers' Democratic League 1

Majority Socialists Have Plurality

This gives the majority socialists a plurality, with other socialistic groups so well represented that a constitution that would be called radical in any of the older countries of the world is practically assured.

As for monarchists and monarchists, they are not even thought of by the lawmakers assembled here for the historic founding of a Teutonic democratic republic.

The little city of Weimar, selected for the national assembly, when it became evident that Berlin, with its Kaiser traditions and militaristic atmosphere, would not be acceptable to the democratic Germans, is little more than 30,000 in population, and possesses none of the facilities usually considered essential for a national capital.

Home of Goethe and Schiller

It is the capital of the grand duchy of Saxe-Weimar-Eisenach and is situated on the left bank of the Ilm. It was Goethe's town, and still is permeated by the Goethe atmosphere. Goethe's house, now the Goethe national museum, is one of the show places of the city. Schiller's house also is one of the public assets, and a famous Goethe-Schiller monument adorns the space in front of the theater which has been turned into a national assembly hall for the present gathering. The two great poets sleep in the same vault in the cemetery.

Salaries Left to Delegates

SALEM, Feb. 6.—Efforts to suppress all bills increasing salaries of county officials were defeated on the floor of the senate Wednesday when a resolution, offered by senator Porter and demanding a special committee to investigate all salary bills, was defeated by a vote of ten to 16. Members of the senate said they were willing to leave salary questions to the good judgment of the legislative delegations from the various counties affected by such bills.

Red Flag Bill Passes

SALEM, Feb. 6.—A crowded gallery, which expected to hear impassioned flights of patriotic oratory over Representative Gordon's red flag bill when it came up for final passage in the senate Wednesday, was sorely disappointed. The bill passed by unanimous vote and without comment or speech of any kind.

Gas Tax Bill Up

SALEM, Feb. 6.—The first bill to run the gauntlet of the legislative committee was introduced today by the committee on roads and highways. The measure provides a tax of one cent a gallon on gasoline and half a cent on distillate.

Another bill had been introduced on this subject early in the session, but that measure failed to provide for the administration of the measure and also imposed a tax of a cent a gallon on distillate.

To Invite Taft to Speak

SALEM, Feb. 6.—Ex-President William Howard Taft will be asked to address a joint meeting of the house and senate during his short visit to Oregon next week in the interests of the proposed league of nations. A resolution asking for this meeting was introduced Wednesday by Senator Orton of Multnomah county.

Jobs for Soldiers and Sailors

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Special.

The U. S. civil service commission is perfecting arrangements whereby men who are about to be discharged from the army or navy may receive firsthand information concerning opportunities for employment in the federal civil service. The commission has received authority from the secretary of war and the secretary of the navy to appoint its representatives at all establishments where enlisted men are assembled in considerable numbers. These representatives are now being appointed. They will be prepared to inform the men fully concerning positions which are open, to supply them with application blanks, to assist them if necessary with the execution of their applications and to advise them relative to civil service matters generally.

SEARCHING FOR DISABLED MEN

Free Education and Liberal Support Await Men Disabled in Service.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Special.—Information is desired by the federal board for vocational education concerning every man who has been so disabled either by wounds or disease, in the service of the United States government, as to entitle him to compensation from the war risk insurance bureau.

This information is desired by the federal board for the purpose of offering free education, special training and placement in jobs to those disabled men. While undergoing the process of retraining, the men are given a support allowance of \$65 per month, and more liberal allowance for support of dependents than was awarded when they were in active service. The instruction on trade training is given in the best institutions of the country, and at absolutely no cost whatever to the recipient.

The federal board will assist the wounded or disabled men to ascertain whether they are entitled to compensation under the war risk insurance act, and desires to hear from any and all men who have received serious injuries or impairment. The address is Federal Board for Vocational Education, Washington, D. C.
