HOUSE AND SENATE DISPOSE OF BILLS

SALEM, Feb. 8.—Thirteen senate bills and two house bills were passed in the senate Thursday on third reading, this being the heaviest daily grist yet turned out in the upper branch. Bills passed were:

S. B. 112, by Dimick—Relating to the deposit of moneys in the state treasury.

S. B. 130, by Baldwin—Regulating trust companies.

S. B. 44, by Howell—Providing that county commissioners of Multnomah county shall have exclusive control over the Portland armory.

S. B. 128, by Huston—Providing that order of final discharge must be recorded in all counties where estate holds property.

S. B. 58, by ways and means committee—Repealing law authorizing of fer of state rewards for arrest of persons placing obstructions on railroad tracks.

S. B. 132, by Strayer—Exempting pensions from attachment or execution.

S. B. 124, by Eberhard—Providing how special court venues may be called.

S. B. 129, by J. C. Smith—Relating to payment of bounties.

S. B. 163, by Multnomah delegation—Amending law relative to drawing of juries in justice courts.

S. B. 164, by Multnomah delegation—Relating to method of drawing district court jury lists.

S. B. 142, by Ritter—Increasing salaries of county officials of Umatilla.

S. B. 122, by Eberhard—Providing that judges may extend sittings of grand jury in chambers as well as in open courts.

H. B. 90, by Hare—Authorizing Washington county treasurer to turn over 70 per cent of road tax to treasurer of Hillsboro.

H. B. 163, by Douglas county delegation—Fixing the crab season in Douglas county and making the three spring months an open season on crabs.

House Passes Bills

SALEM, Feb. 8.—The following bills passed the house Thursday:

H. B. 15, by Schuchel—Increasing license fee for foreign corporations to \$200.

H. B. 247, by Schuchel—Relating to workmen's compensation act.

H. B. 12, by Burnatch—Requiring witness to have been convicted of felony before he may be impeached.

H. B. 80, by Gallagher—Making notes given on insurance policies non-negotiable for 60 days after issuance.

H. B. 142, by Dodd—Extending time before schools open to 60 days as period before which teachers may resign without losing certificate.

H. B. 196, by Burnatch—Relating to summons in justice courts.

H. B. 206, by Lewis—Relating to tenancy from month to month.

H. B. 208, by Westeland—Allowing lime to be sold outside the state.

H. B. 248, by Idelman—Relating to limitation of action in event of fraud.

H. B. 282, by Buddick—Providing method for advertising work on irrigation districts.

H. B. 305, by Lund—Providing for confiscation of automobiles on second conviction for driving while in an intoxicated condition.

H. B. 284, by Edwards—Providing for apportionment of school money when school is closed due to epidemic.

H. B. 318, by Graham—Fixing salary of assistant to school superintendent in Lane county.

H. B. 319, by Hare—Providing for uniform commitment blanks.

H. B. 75, by Gallagher—Relating to attorneys' fees in suits or actions.

College Bulletin Out—

The February number of the Albany College Bulletin is out today and contains several interesting articles. One explains the free scholarships that will be given all returning soldiers and sailors. The college will also assist the boys in securing work to pay for all other expenses. An article is given on a bill that is before the legislature to exclude the study of German from all schools. The college believes that an adequate knowledge of German should be taught in the schools and colleges so that when that nation

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comes out from under the cloud of its present infamy, brutality and illegality the associations so profitable and helpful a hundred years ago may be renewed. In the meantime, a knowledge of the German language should be common in this country so that we may be up on all that they do, say or propose.

Constitution Half Drafted

PARIS, Feb. 8.—U. P.—The league of nations committee has completed half of the draft of the constitution for the league, it was announced yesterday.
