THE ANNUAL DELUGE

At least once every year the residents of the southwestern part of the city are put to the inconvenience of having to wade in their lawns to rescue goods which float around in the water which seeps in following an unusually hard rain. Many homes dependent upon furnace heat go cold. The Central School suspends sessions because the furnace room is flooded and heating the building is an impossibility. Various causes are assigned to the trouble. Some say the Calapooia street sewer is too small to carry off the surplus surface water, which backs up into the basements. Others claim that there is just a lack of proper drainage in that district. Whatever the cause there is a problem for the city to solve and the sooner it is remedied the better for the peace and comfort of the residents of that afflicted district.

Speaking of rain, the heavy down-pour of the last three days is a splendid indication of big crops this summer and fall. A copious supply of snow covers the mountains, insuring plenty of water for mining and keeping the streams supplied during the summer months. OPPOSITES RECONCILED

What discriminating observers suspected at the time of the apparent clash in peace policies between Clemenceau and Wilson turns out to be true. Wilson with his league of nations plan and Clemenceau with his declared preference for the balance of power were not really in opposition.

What Clemenceau wanted was a "balance" of power with all the power on one side of the balance. Of course his desire to bring together France, Britain, America and Italy in a working partnership meant that very thing. Now the partnership has been extended to take in Japan.

These five big powers absolutely

dominate the world. The other nations represented at Paris are considered and consulted; they are dealt with courteously and planned for justly. But of themselves they have little weight. Single or united, they cannot successfully oppose any measure for which the big five stand—or indeed, any measure desired by the big three, Britain, America and France.

These five, therefore, are the foundation of the League of Nations. They are the charter members. They are the League. The organization will be what they make it, and only those whom they admit on their own terms will belong.

So, it seems, both Clemenceau and Wilson have their way.

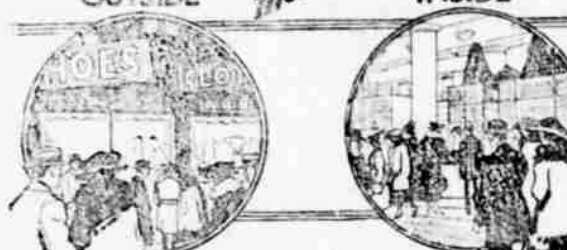
Maybe the Roosters
