LEADERSHIP AT HAND

The opportunity is at hand to make Linn county one of the most prolific producers of small fruits in the United States and it is not too much to say that within a few years this part of the Willamette Valley is capable of exceeding in extent the acreage devoted to this phase of agriculture in the Puget Sound and Sumner valleys between Seattle and Tacoma. Those are small districts, while the broad fields of the Willamette Valley offer almost unlimited opportunities for expansion.

To make the success that has been made in the Washington districts there must be a leader. That man is now here. Hon. W. H. Paulhamus demonstrated his good faith last year by taking the management of the Linn and Benton Fruit Growers' association and paying the highest prices ever received in this valley for small fruits. This year he has been re-elected to manage the association and comes with the announcement that even higher prices will prevail than in 1918. He brings the experience of a successful conduct of this line of business and has the ability and the knowledge of markets to make it a success in this locality.

What Mr. Paulhamus needs more than anything else is the united support and cooperation of the farmers and businessmen of Linn and Benton counties. He knows what is marketable and how to market it. If his advice is followed in planting and harvesting the desired varieties of fruits, berries and vegetables in sufficient quantities there is no reason why Albany should not become the largest small fruit producing center in the state.

What has been lacking in past efforts has been the leadership that could get the united support of the farmers and others concerned. Mr. Paulhamus now brings this much-needed quality and it is up to the people who are bound to profit from his leadership to get squarely behind him and help him carry on to success.

TIME ON NITRATES EXTENDED TO FEB. 15 BY GOVERNMENT

O. A. C., Corvallis, Feb. 12.—Special.—The time limit for buying agricultural nitrate has been extended by the federal government to Feb. 15. Farmers wanting to participate in the federal supply may do so through their county agents or other authorized agency only. The price is \$1 a ton plus freight charges from San Francisco.
