McADOO IN THE MOVIES

So Mr. McAdoo has joined the procession and is going into the movies! Not that the former many-jobbed secretary of the treasury means to be an actor, or even a manager; but he is entering the movie field just the same. It is stated that he is to act as general counsel for the "Big Five" collectively known by the euphonious title of the United Artists Distributing association, and dealing in the cinematography of Mary Pickford, Charlie Chaplin, Douglas Fairbanks, David Griffith and William S. Hart. His salary is unofficially estimated at \$100,000 a year.

It was generally supposed that Mr. McAdoo would take the management of some great bank or manufacturing corporation. After the responsibility that he carried during the war, it might seem that no private job in the country would be too big for him. It is not necessary to revise any such expectation, but rather to revise many people's estimate of the moving picture business. Formerly a mere toy, it is now a business giant, able to command the services of the ablest men in the country.

That "wet" attempt to kill the prohibition amendment by a referendum vote is ill-fated at the start. It's being launched in 13 states.

THE 'V' LOAN IS NECESSARY

There seems to be a current impression that the next Liberty Loan is unnecessary. Many people have the idea that the \$15,000,000,000 recently voted back to the treasury by congress is so much cash paid in. Such is not the case. What took place was the cancellation of authorized expenditures to that amount in the future. However much money we do have to raise for warring up the war, it will be \$15,000,000,000 less for this year than was expected before last Nov. 11. This reduction was anticipated by the treasury department soon after the armistice and allowed for in the forecast of coming expenditures.

There are still war bills to be paid. And more will be incurred even though the fighting is ended. Our army of occupation remains to be fed and clothed and paid. We must also share with our allies the expense of assuring the peace that should follow the victory.

The Fifth Loan, therefore, is quite important. Nobody should feel that simply because the armistice was signed all need for lending money to the government is past. Gratitude and thankfulness for the victory that has

been won and confidence in the peace that is being established can be best expressed by hearty support of the coming Victory Loan.

Congress could tell the peace conference what to do with better grace if it had got its own work done.

A lot of American statesmen will never forgive that peace conference for doing what the American people want it to do.

MEMORIAL TO LATE COL. ROOSEVELT IS TO BE DYNAMIC

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—Special.—The permanent memorial to be erected by nationwide popular subscription to the memory of Theodore Roosevelt must "not be merely a thing of stone and bronze," but, "like Theodore Roosevelt himself, it must be dynamic."

Such is the aim voiced by the Roosevelt Permanent Memorial National Committee, which has opened offices on the 29th floor of 1 Madison Avenue.

In a statement issued by the committee it was made clear that the members of the committee will remain open-minded for many months on the exact form to be taken by the memorial and promise to give all suggestions from sources outside the committee the most careful consideration. It was further explained that the administration expenses of the committee would be borne by separate subscriptions, and that "every penny given for the memorial will be spent for a memorial."

Contributions to the memorial fund are solicited and will be promptly acknowledged, and deposited with the treasurer, Albert H. Wiggin of the Chase National Bank.

140 PHARMACISTS FROM O. A. C. SERVE COUNTRY IN WAR

O. A. C., Corvallis, Feb. 14.—Special.—An honor roll containing the names of 140 O. A. C. pharmacists—men and women—who enlisted in military service has just been prepared by Dean Adolph Zieffle of the school of pharmacy. Not a single death has been reported although students in the school of pharmacy served in almost every branch of service, many attaining high rank.

Recipe for Keeping Bacon

J. H. Scott, of Tangent, uses the following recipe with success: After the meat has been dry salted for six to eight weeks, wash off in hot water and allow it to dry off for one day. Then take pulverized borax and any kind of pepper in equal parts, well mixed, and sift thoroughly on the fleshy parts of the meat, and hang up. It may be smoked or not at the pleasure of the owner.

This will keep all kinds of insects from injuring it in any way. The borax and pepper will not injure the flavor or in the least, and it will keep in good condition through the year.
