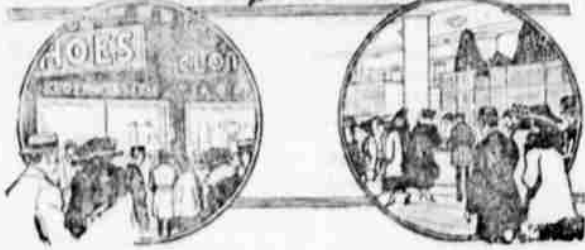

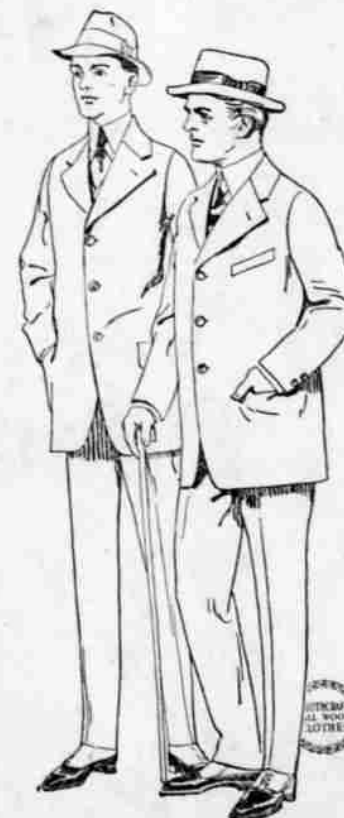
W. S. S. Record at Baker

O. A. C., Feb. 14.—Baker county made an excellent showing in its thrift campaign as shown by the figures just compiled by Supt. A. C. Strang, of the Baker schools, for 1918. Records for 90 schools show that 1635 pupils purchased thrift

stamps, making a saving of \$33,480.68. War gardens were undertaken by 408 children, the value of produce being \$1758.05. Chickens were raised by 259 pupils, pigs by 135, and 881 persons made over old clothes.
