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WAR AND PEACE

The finest thing about the war, so far as America was concerned, was the spirit of cooperation that it developed. The nation functioned more perfectly than ever before in all its history, and incomparably better than it had been functioning in recent decades.

Political parties largely dropped their prejudices and rivalries and worked together. The government held out its hand to business, and business responded with right good will. The ablest men in many lines of industry and commerce gave their services to the nation, freely and gladly. Congress, for a time, dropped its suspicion of captains of industry. Corporations showed themselves possessed of unsuspected patriotism. Bankers and laborers toiled for the common cause with equal enthusiasm and self-forgetfulness. The farmers did their share. The miners did their share. It was literally a people's war, and all kinds of people helped each other to win it.

Now that the war is won, are we going to lose all that generous spirit, and the fruits that come from it?

Already there are only too many signs of a reaction. Congress once more is a nest of partisan politics. Government and business begin again to distrust and antagonize each other. Labor and capital grow restive and intolerant again. Wartime cooperation melts away, mechanism and spirit alike.

Surely this is not inevitable. We are the same nation as before, the same individuals as before. There is still a cause to serve. Reconstruction problems are almost as important as were war problems. Shall they be treated in the old, bickering, lately forgotten fashion merely because there is no martial glamor about them?

WATCHING GERMANY

Some of the Americans who have 'wound up as the watch on the Rhine' will be leaving soon, if the present German process in restoring order continues. But Marshal Foch estimates that 400,000 of them will be obliged to stay until the peace treaty is signed. That may be a few weeks hence, and it may be several months.

The French are maintaining 800,000 troops on similar duty. The British are let off with 200,000, on account of their heavy military responsibilities in Turkey and elsewhere. Belgium will keep 100,000 mobilized along the Rhine. This leaves Foch 1,500,000 fighting men, a force which he considers essential to keep on the frontier until it is apparent that the German menace is over and that Germany is willing and able to discharge the responsibilities imposed by her conquerors.

It is not likely that all the American forces will return at once even after Germany has agreed to the peace terms. It may be considered necessary to maintain allied garrisons in Germany or on the frontier until the terms are actually complied with. It is a disagreeable duty, but necessary, in order to reap the full fruits of victory.

Needless to say, no soldier should complain, and no thoughtless relative or friend should encourage a soldier in complaining. Those boys on the Rhine are performing as valuable a service as they and their comrades performed in the bloody battles that opened the way to the Rhine.

Franklin Tells Where Money Went

Lewis B. Franklin, director of the War Loan Organization, tells the why of the Victory Liberty Loan in these words:

"The money subscribed in the Fourth Loan, which was \$1,000,000,000 in excess of what we asked, lasted the Treasury Department only until the tenth day of December, when we found ourselves again pumped dry."

"The expenditure of the Treasury Department, the actual cash outgo, last December was \$2,000,000,000. The annual rate of expenditure before the war was about \$1,000,000,000 a year."

This money and more, Franklin said, went to pay the cost of guns, ships, ammunition, food and equipment that never actually got into the war but which caused Germany to surrender. Germany's surrender saved the lives of 500,000 of our boys.

A lot of the money to be realized from the Victory Liberty Loan has been spent already. It helped to save those 500,000 soldier boys' lives.
