FAIRMOUNT GRANGE PASSES RESOLUTIONS ON ROAD BOND BILL

Last Saturday evening Fairmount Grange No. 252 held one of the most interesting meetings of the year. The \$10,000,000 bond bill for roads now before the legislature was discussed and the following resolution was passed and ordered sent to representatives and to the legislative committee of the State Grange.

"Whereas, a certain bill is now before the state legislature proposing to bond the state for \$10,000,000 for road purposes, and,

"Whereas, it is the sentiment of this grange that all road work should be under the direct control of the county court of each county under supervision of a competent road engineer with county owned rock crusher and all other machinery, the necessary funds to be raised in some manner other than bonding; Now, therefore, be it

"Resolved that Fairmount Grange No. 252 of Benton Co., Oregon, goes on record as opposed to the \$10,000,000
