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A CLEAN SWEEP

Perhaps the finest thing about the League of Nations constitution is that it proposes to make a clean sweep. It does not build any new structure of internationalism alongside of an old one. It does not nail on any leantos, or patch up any leaky roofs, or repair any defective plumbing. It creates a wholly new edifice, complete in itself or with power to grow complete, doing away at the same time with The Hague and with all conflicting treaties between individual nations and groups of nations, and giving the new organization authority over the whole body of international law.

In Article XXV, "The high contracting parties severally agree that the present covenant is accepted as abrogating all obligations inter se which are inconsistent with the terms thereof, and solemnly engage that they will not hereafter enter into any engagements inconsistent with the terms thereof. In case any of the powers signatory thereto or subsequently admitted into the League shall, before becoming a party to this covenant, have undertaken any rigorous obligations which are inconsistent with the terms of this covenant, it shall be the duty of such power to take immediate steps to procure its release from such obligations."

Thus a lot of treaties that are now in existence, complicating international relations and serving as potential perils to the safety of the world, will be made scraps of paper when the

constitution has been formally approved. Moreover, it is provided that any international agreement entered into by member nations hereafter shall be published by the secretary of the League, so that secret diplomacy will automatically disappear.

"INDUSTRIAL PRUSSIANISM"

Premier Lloyd George announces, on behalf of the British government, for the benefit of certain groups of British workmen:

"We are determined to fight Prussianism in the industrial world exactly as we fought it on the continent of Europe. No section of this community, however powerful, shall be allowed to hold up the whole nation."

This is not too drastic a characterization of the principles and practices of many labor leaders in Great Britain and elsewhere. The movements they represent are nothing less than Prussianism in a new guise. They seek to impose their will on society, and on the whole nation, no less than did the military masters of Germany.

It is little palliation of their offense that they represent 'labor' rather than 'capital.' The underlying principle is the same—the attempted exploitation and control of society by a special class. They stand for tyranny. They aim at the overthrow of democratic government. They interfere with the natural, friendly and rational working out of a sound economic system, in which employer and employee might cooperate in every industry and each receive his due share of their combined effort.

This 'Prussianism' is not necessarily Bolshevism, though that is one aspect of it. It may be trade unionism, under evil leadership, demanding impossible high wages and short hours—some British strikers are demanding a five or six hour day—and using its industrial and political power as a club to get them. It is not only wrong—it is foolish, because no permanent benefit can come from it to the workmen themselves.

Big Mill Closes

The big tie mill at Devitt was closed down a few days ago, according to reports received in Corvallis. The closing of the mill is a matter of concern to the people of Philomath as many residents of that little city are employed in the mill and a large per cent of the pay roll goes into Philomath. Eight of the 75 tie mills in Oregon are located in the Devitt vicinity. With the understanding that all the ties that could be cut would be taken at a basic price, the mills there engaged larger crews of workmen, made contracts with loggers and supply houses that the output might meet the demand. The Devitt mill is one of the first to close, but others are to do so at once. Mill owners say they are forced to do so because of the elimination of their market by restricting them to one buyer and a too rigid inspection.—Gazette-Times.
