DETROIT DISTRICT
VOTES ROAD TAX;
TO BUILD NEW ROAD

Orin Judd of Detroit, a subscriber
to the Democrat for the last 25 years,
called at the office and renewed his
subscription for another year. When
Mr. Judd advertised his final proof on
his homestead in the Democrat in 1895
he began taking the paper and has
kept paid in advance ever since.

Mr. Judd reports that the road dis-
trict about Detroit has voted a ten-
mill road tax and will build a road
from the end of the present highway
at Niagara to Detroit, a distance of
12 miles. The tax this year brought
in about \$5500 and the district has
more than \$5,000 on hand. Nothing
will be done this year, but by next
year the amount on hand is expected
to be \$12,000, at which time the gov-
ernment will be asked to put up a
similar amount, enough to undertake
the work.

With the road built to Detroit it is
expected that a wagon road will be
opened up to Breitenbush. A trail has
served these districts all the years.

opening up in his district. The Ham-
mond camp is ready to open up and
Hall's camp, below Detroit, will be in
operation as soon as weather permits.
When Mr. Judd left Detroit yesterday
six inches of snow covered the ground
and was still falling.
