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PATRIOTIC STATESMANSHIP

No finer example of patriotic non-partisanship has been seen in this generation than the conduct of former president Taft with regard to President Wilson's work for a League of Nations.

Mr. Taft takes the position that Mr. Wilson has been laboring at Paris not as a democrat, but as an American, trying to get for America what the vast majority of Americans want. Mr. Taft is therefore collaborating with him, as an American and not as a republican.

He does not agree with every detail of the President's plans. He does not profess blanket approval of the entire constitution which the President is reporting and explaining to the nation. But he does plead for a square man who presents it, because even in deal for that constitution, and for the its present rough shape it seems to him to offer more hope for mankind than any other device yet put forward. "This is not a political question," he says, "God forbid!"

This is unquestionably the attitude of the big body of nonpartisan citizens. It is probably the attitude of the majority of republicans, despite the efforts of some of the party's representatives in the senate and house to give a contrary impression.

UNFAIR TO HAWAII

Hawaii is woefully misunderstood and grievously wronged. A resident of those sunny islands breaks forth in vehement protest against things now associated with Hawaii in the public mind. He indignantly repudiates the notion that Hawaii is a "sort of tropical Eden where society and business are maintained by bands of grass-skirted houis armed with ukuleles and where the only diversions are hula-dancing and poi-eating contests."
