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THE INTERNATIONAL PROCESSION

"One thing that should be understood in America at this time," writes Herbert B. Swope, an American correspondent in Paris, "is that the League of Nations will be given life and force with or without American consent. It is ours to choose whether we will march in the forefront of the movement or stand aside while the procession goes by, united in common purpose for the common good."

"Our failure might block or delay it, but it cannot prevent it, and the harm in such a failure will be less to the world than it will be to ourselves." This seems to be a fair and clear statement of the situation. The League of Nations impulse came from America, but the movement has now gone beyond our control. And there can be only one answer.

America may play her part—for her own sake, no less than the sake of the rest of the world. Any other course would be not only shameful and cowardly, but suicidal.

THE WAR-DAMAGE BILL

The general public does not make any fine distinctions between "damages," "reparation" and "indemnity." It feels that while Germany can never pay in full for her war crimes, she should be obliged to pay all that it is possible to get out of her, to make good the computable harm she has done by depredations on land and sea, and to teach her people an unforgettable lesson.

The peace conference seems now to be actually working on this principle. The "reparation committee" after long investigation is said to have reached a rough conclusion as to how much Germany can pay, and how to make her pay it.

The sum is given as somewhere between \$25,000,000,000 and \$40,000,000,000. This is much more modest than the claims set forth some time ago, aggregating about \$140,000,000,000. Added to the German national debt, it is probably a little less than the entire wealth of the German Empire.

It seems to be agreed that any heavier imposition than this would defeat its own purpose, because it would drive the German people into despair and rebellion and stop production. In order to get any considerable sum of money from Germany it is necessary to have order, economic organization and political responsibility.

The tentative plan is to obtain an immediate payment, in cash or negotiable bonds, of about \$5,000,000,000, and arrange for the rest over a long period of years, with Germany paying the interest and providing an amortization fund for the eventual wiping out of the debt. The money first obtained would go for the restoration of France, Belgium and the other devastated countries.
