LEBANON PIONEER
REMEMBERS SEEING
FIRST BIG HORSE

David H. Peterson, one of Lebanon's oldest living pioneers, was in the city yesterday transacting business at the courthouse and attending to other matters in this city. Mr. Peterson was born in 1844 and crossed the plains with his parents the same year. That winter was spent on the Luckiamute river in Polk county. In 1846 his parents moved to Linn county and took up a donation land claim at the little south of Lebanon which bears the family name.

Mr. Peterson's earliest recollection dates back to 1847 when he saw Jeremiah Ralston, who came from Lebanon, Ohio, and founded the town of Lebanon, Oregon. Mr. Ralston was at that time riding a large American horse, the first of that type that Mr. Peterson had seen, and the impression gained at that time lasted throughout his life. He had previously seen only the smaller Indian ponies and the horses which were brought across the plains by emigrants. Jeremiah Ralston was the father of J. M. Ralston, and an uncle of Jas. H. Ralston.

Mr. Peterson has lived in Linn county all his life with the exception of a few years spent in the stock business in Eastern Oregon. His mother died last winter at the age of more than 90 years.
