PLANT 'BACKBONE' GARDEN CROPS, IS ADVICE OF EXPERT

The gardener has a choice between vegetables but in the long run it will pay him both for his own sake and for the help he can be in fighting world food shortage, to stick pretty close to the staple crops, says today's bulletin from the National War Garden Commission. Vast quantities of food are needed to feed the hungry nations and the Victory Gardeners of the United States can perform a wonderful service. Any reader of this paper who has not yet received a free garden book should write to the Commission in Washington and get a copy, enclosing a two cent stamp for postage. The backbone garden crops are potatoes, lima beans, snap beans, sweet corn, tomatoes, cabbage and onions. These crops make a good fighting or working ration, but don't neglect the good 'eats' like peas, beets, carrots, radishes, lettuce and others. Give right of way to the main crops, and plant the secondary ones in between them if land is scarce.

By good planting you can grow lettuce, radishes, beets, carrots and turnips in rows between the main crops and get them on the way when the main crops need all of the room. And then later in the season when the backbone crops are maturing you can plant another crop of the others for fall use.

WARNING—Don't work the soil when it is too wet. You can ruin your garden by being in too great a hurry. Pick up a handful of soil. If it sticks together, you are too early—wait until it crumbles in your hand; then it is time to spade. —Adv.

LINN COUNTY WOMAN IS TRAPPER — CAUGHT TWO BIG GRAY WOLVES

of the mountains 15 miles back of Foster on the North Fork of the Santiam. To reach civilization she had to ride horseback to Foster, which trip she made alone through the snowclad mountains with the white flakes falling fast as she rode. It had been snowing for two days.

Lives Outdoor Life

Pretty and shy, Mrs. Blanchard told her story to the admiring group that gathered in the clerk's office. She is straight and slender, with an agile suppleness to her body that bespeaks a lifetime spent in the mountains. Her eyes are gray, or blue—it is hard to tell just which. Her cheeks bear the imprint of the Cascades winds, and color even deeper as she talks. Her slow, drawing voice gives one the impression that she must have lived in Tennessee or Kentucky, but she is a native Oregonian, having spent nearly all of her 23 years in Tillamook and Linn counties.

Most women shy at a mouse, but not Mrs. Blanchard. "I love the mountains and the big out of doors," she said. "Scared? I should say not. I have my horse and rifle and with them as company I am never lonesome nor afraid. I had a dog once, but he wasn't a success, so I've never tried another."

Wolves Killed Cattle
"How did I happen to go to trap-

ping? Well, you see, we live back there in the hills, grow a little feed and raise livestock. Every year we drive a few head to market. But this year business wasn't so good. The wolves killed seven of our cattle and that was quite a loss to us. The men tried hunting the wolves and coyotes, but it was slow work in making any headway. I told them one day that I was going to try trapping. They just laughed at me; but I got some strychnine and drove an old horse up the mountain and shot it. Then I poisoned the carcass; but the beasts refused to die. I next tried cyanide, but that failed to kill them.

Collects Bounty Money

"So I got some No. 4 traps and set them. The first wolf I caught weighed 103 pounds after he had fought for hours trying to free himself. My! but he was a big fellow. He didn't have much fight when I got to him and killed him easily with a club. But the other one that weighed 90 pounds fought like a demon and I had a hard time with him. I had no trouble with the coyote or the cats."

Mrs. Blanchard collected \$22 from the county on her catch. The state will pay her \$40 more for the two wolves. She will get from \$15 to \$20 each for the wolf hides, \$2.50 to \$3 each for the bobcats and at least \$10 for the coyote. She ships her furs to Chicago, where she has already sent some mink and coon skins. This is her first winter at trapping but she finds it most profitable and fascinating and will go in for it on a larger scale next year.

Brothers in Service

Mrs. Blanchard's father, P. Gwinn, lives near his home and is working his gold mines, upon which he has just proved up. He is just developing his properties, which promise to be good payers. The farther he goes the better the prospects.
