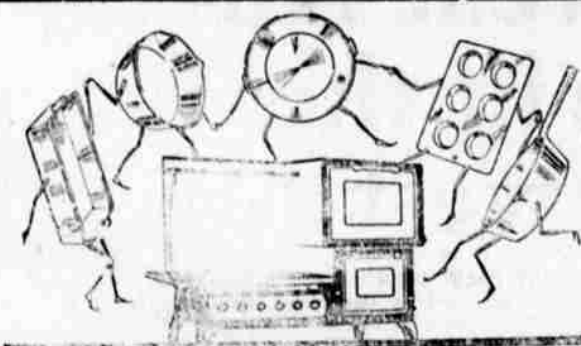
First Presbyterian church of Lebanon was well represented last night at the New Era conference. The delegation consisting of the following well known citizens: Rev. Conolen, H. Y.
