ROUSED BY THE WAR

A young Italian who came to this country nine years ago was telling some American acquaintances of his awakened desire to become an American citizen.

Then the war came along and gave him a jolt. He found that he wanted to be an American citizen. He voluntarily sought out a school and began to study the English language.

In two years he was speaking and writing English fairly well. He has taken out his first citizenship papers. Also he has secured different work that throws him with Americans instead of confining him with a small racial group.

The case of this Italian boy is probably typical of many other foreigners in this country.

Until roused by the war, he and others like him drifted in the easiest course, which was unfair both to them and to America.

Americanization workers are now going into the foreign sections of our cities and towns, carrying the "learn English" campaign right to the people who are most inclined to overlook their opportunities and forget their obligations to their adopted land.

It is not likely that prices in general will drop much, unless times become so bad that the bottom drops out of everything; and in that case, the losses in earnings will more than wipe out the apparent saving in prices. It is easier to pay high prices when you have money than low prices when you have none.

It is the way of social and political safety, too. Hard times, as the director suggests, breed discontent. Unemployment is the prolific cause of Bolshevism. "Buying now" will keep men busy earning a comfortable living, and therefore keep them from starting or joining "Red" movements.
