THE PEOPLE SAY IT

As the straw vote which is being held by the Oregon Journal progresses the attitude of the people of the Oregon country toward a league of nations as advocated by President Wilson and Ex-President Taft is revealed. More than 10,000 people have already expressed their desire for the consummation of a league of nations which will make future wars impossible and assure the small nation of a square deal along with the larger ones. But 75 people have taken the opportunity to express their views adversely. It is an indication of the mighty majority back of the President in this territory, and a similar ballot conducted in any other section of the United States would probably show the same results. Senator Lodge, with Penrose, Borah and others, are against the plan. They claim to be in favor of a league to preserve peace, but differ as to methods. Lodge believes that the sovereignty of the United States as a nation would be imperiled. That may be, but President Wilson has some pretty fair ideas along that line himself and people seem inclined to trust to his judgment.

Some of the republican leaders are alarmed by the way other republican leaders are offering their support to the league of nations plan. But they needn't take it so seriously. The truth of the matter is that the league of nations hasn't anything at all to do with party politics.

THE PACIFIC HIGHWAY

With the awarding of the contract for the paving of seven miles of the Pacific Highway from Jefferson to Albany, Linn county has taken a long leap out of the mud. Seven miles does not take the road across the county, but it is a big beginning. By the time this work is finished it is most likely that the contract will be awarded for the Tangent-Albany branch and that means 14 miles under hard surface. By the end of 1920 practically every mile between the California state line and Vancouver, Wash., will be paved.

What an attraction to tourists to drive westward and up through Oregon, spending their money in the beautiful Northwest instead of in Europe or in other sections of the United States! What an aid to better farming this will be, with more rapid transportation to and from the farm to markets, in saving on wear and tear on cars and in costs of operation! What a delight to get away from the everlasting mud in winter and dust in summer!

With the completion of the Pacific Highway paving, which will also mean the completion of the Columbia and Eastern Oregon Highway, with hard surface connection with Astoria, laterals will be run into the producing districts. Linn county looks longingly for laterals to Lebanon and Brownsville and then the road through Sweet Home, Foster, Cascade and over the mountains to Black Rock. There are government funds to help build this important link connecting Eastern and Western Oregon, and it is the task of the local Chamber of Commerce, assisted by the County Chamber of Commerce, to bring it about.

This is but one reason why every businessman, every professional man, every farmer in the locality should belong to the Albany Chamber of Commerce. The annual meeting will be held Thursday evening.
